Schmidt, commissioner of immigration of the Book Island, Frisco lines. of the Rock Island-'Frisco lines, has compiled figures to show that during the fiscal year end. ing June 30, 1908, more people came into the United States from Canada than emigrated from this country to Canada. He obtained his figures from reports of the commissioners of immigration of the United States and Canada.

During the year Mr. Schmidt finds that 56,860 left the United States to take up homes in Canada, while 58,268 came from Canada to live in this country, a difference of 1,408 in favor of the United States.


