ORANGEMEN PLAN BIG DEMONSTRATION

Festivities at Stratford Promise to Break All Records.

Stratford, June 22.—At a recent meeting of the Stratford Orange Lodge it was decided to hold the annual church parade on July 10. Arrangements were also furthered in connection with the monster celebration, which will be held here July 12. Altogether the celebration will be one of the biggest ever witnessed in Western Ontario. There will be seven special trains coming into Stratford that day from points within a radius of 50 miles. Besides there will quite likely be a large number of Orangemen coming from even greater distances, inasmuch as it is being arranged to offer special prizes for bands and lodges coming the longest distances. Prizes will also be offered for athletic events, and a baseball game will be held between two of the best baseball teams in the country. The Stratford lodge will turn out 100 strong for the occasion, and a piccolo band of 20 pieces. It is expected that the grand chaplain, Canon Welsh, will address the Orangemen here; also some of the most prominent members from the various lodges throughout the province will be present. A monster parade has been planned, which will be the feature of the day. The city council has, upon the urgent request of Chief Secretary Ireland of the order, consented to ride in the procession in carriages.

AN ODD RESCUE.

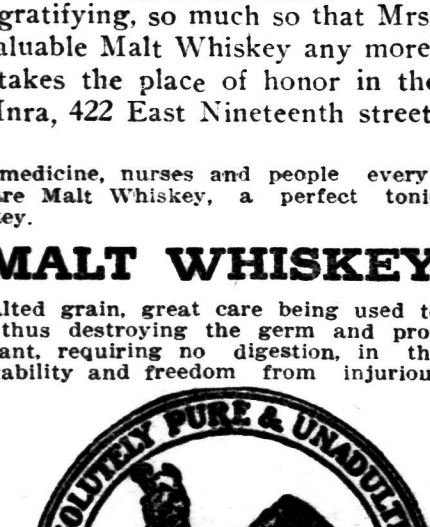

COAL DEALERS AT PORT STANLEY

Delegates to the Convention Enjoyed a Banquet Last Night

PRAISE FOR CANADIANS

American Visitors Speak Highly of the Members of the Ontario Association.

The members of the Canadian Retail Coal Association believe Port Stanley to be an ideal summer resort. They went down to the number of 175, and those who had never visited the Port before were loud in their praises of its many attractions. At night they attended a banquet.

Naturally the after-dinner speeches savored somewhat of coal. The toast list embraced all the various departments of the trade, and by restricting the length of the speeches it was made possible to hear a great many speakers.

Mr. Cyril Dwight-Edwards provided the musical programme in his usual capable style. He rendered several selections and was recalled each time. Mr. Fred Evans acted as accompanist.

The two flags. A feature of the banquet was the intertwining of the two flags on the menu card. The reason was the visit of a large number of United States coal merchants, and the two countries joined hands in good-fellowship over the festive board.

In keeping with this, toasts were drunk to both the King and the President, while "God Save the King" and "The Star-Spangled Banner" swelled forth from the 175 throats.

Mr. R. J. Webster, president of the London Association, and secretary of the Canadian Retail Association, acted as chairman, introducing the earlier part of the programme. Later on Mr. J. M. Daly took over the latter part of the programme as vice-chairman.

The first toast was that to the coal producers, connected with which were the names of a number of prominent coal producers from the other side. Mr. Tremaine, of the Rochester office of the Philadelphia and Reading Iron and Coal Company, was the first speaker. He congratulated the association upon its successful convention.

"We producers," he said, "find far less annoying features with the dealers in Canada than with our dealers in the United States."

The Coal Convention. Mr. E. B. Reid, of the Delaware and Lackawanna Coal Company, said: "The Canadian Coal Association has the finest convention that is held anywhere. You meet together for business, and you contract business, consequently it is a pleasure for the sales agents to attend."

Mr. George Bolton, Detroit, agent of the Lehigh Valley Coal Company, said: "These conventions always elevate the trade. Next year I would like to see the association grow, and instead of 200 members, I would like to see 600."

Mr. John Fraser, of the Susquehanna Coal Company, moved a hearty vote of thanks to the London dealers, which was heartily taken up. "Over here," he said, "I notice you don't have any Harry Thaw."

"I like Canada, I admire her institutions, and above everything, I admire her law-abiding people."

In a patriotic strain, Mr. Fraser proposed a toast to Canada and the United States, the older and younger sons of the same grandmother.

Mr. D. A. Russell, vice-president of the Delaware and Lackawanna Coal Company, spoke briefly.

The Ontario Dealers. In response to the toast to "The Ontario Retail Dealers' Coal Association," Mr. William Heaman delivered an excellent address.

"As a direct result of the efforts of this association," said Mr. Heaman, "we have gained 72 hours for the unloading of a car of coal, instead of 48 as formerly."

"There are a great many dealers," he continued, "who do not weigh their coal. This is harmful. The association went to a great deal of expense to force the railways to put in weigh scales, and if the dealers do not use them they will lose them."

Messrs. Hardy and Ray also spoke in response to this toast. The retailers were represented by Mr. Vickers, of Princeton, and Mr. Brown, who spoke of the benefits derived by the retailers from contact with the association.

The lengthy nature of the programme detained the party somewhat later than was originally expected, and it was 12 o'clock before the return to the city took place.
