The sum of \$15,000 a year has been granted by the Provincial Government nominally for the maintenance of the Hygienic Institute, but it will go to strengthen the Western University, chiefly on its medical and scientific sides. A few years ago the sem of \$5,000 was set aside for the purpose, but this was not considered sufficient, and the Government after some consideration have trebled the

Every effort will be made to secure a worthy head for the university and also for the Hygienic Institute. The salary to be paid the former will be \$5,000 a year, and the latter \$4,-


