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LYNCH OF TYPOS IN FIERY SPEECH

Printers' President Routes Faction Which Wanted Eighteen Directors.

CALLED QUACK REMEDY

Declares He Could Build Up a Complete Autocracy Under the System.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 15.—A bold attack was made by the "Progressives" in the International Typographical Union's convention today upon the alleged autocracy of the administration. Unlike the motion picture directed by the anti-administration forces against the proposal to make the term of office of the International officers four years, the attack failed. President James M. Lynch himself took the floor in opposition to the "Progressives' proposal to appoint a board of eighteen directors, who would be given much of the power now wielded by the president and the executive council of three. Turning the gavel over to Vice-President George A. Tracy, Lynch, in a fiery speech, condemned the anti-administrationists as "quacks with quack remedies" for imagined ills of the organization. He declared that every so-called progressive measure that has yet been offered would, if adopted, mean \$50,000 to \$60,000 a year greater expense. Although the proposed legislation contemplated the elimination of autocracy, Lynch said that if it were passed and he could not build up "the most complete autocracy in existence," he would renounce all claim to ability.

"When you criticize this autocracy," said Mr. Lynch, "show where it has failed. Can you find a trade union in the world that has made greater progress in the last decade? You are told it is a machine. Well, maybe I have, but if you want to see a smoothly running, well-oiled machine, just attend the next convention of the American Federation of Labor and watch the workings of its executive board of eleven members. That is what your eighteen members board of directors would be."

For fifteen minutes a demonstration for Lynch continued. The conclusion of his speech, and shortly after the convention defeated the board proposition overwhelmingly.

The ladies' auxiliary of the union is still in turmoil. Tonight the main body is awaiting the return of the books by Mrs. Frank W. Long, secretary and treasurer, who walked out of the convention, followed by a small coterie, because her choice for stenographer was not that of the auxiliary. Today a registered letter was sent Mrs. Long, demanding the return of the books and machine. The only acknowledgment was a receipt of their letter. The auxiliary has consulted a lawyer and also has advised its bank to honor no drafts made by Mrs. Long upon the body's funds.

PANAMA CANAL BILL IN FINAL STAGES

Conferees' Recommendation Is Before Both House and Senate.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The Panama Canal bill agreed to yesterday by the conferees of the House and Senate will be pushed for final action in both bodies tomorrow. Opposition is expected from those who oppose tolls to coastwise ships or who object to other provisions of the bill, notably the railway and anti-trust sections. Senator Bristow, Progressive, was

ONLY REPRESENTATIVE OF THE REPUBLICAN FORCES OF THE TWO BODIES WHO SIGNED THE CONFERENCE AGREEMENT. HE WILL JOIN WITH SENATOR SIMMONS, DEMOCRAT, IN URGING APPROVAL OF THE AGREEMENT.

It is understood that Senator Brantley has made it clear to Republicans in the Senate who oppose the bill as now agreed upon, that he will object to any temporary resolution that would carry final approval of the bill over until December. One plan suggested was to give President Taft authority to begin an organization of the canal forces, leaving the general subjects of tolls and railroad control of steamship lines to be settled at the next session. Representative Adams, who framed the original canal bill, is expected to have the support of the Democratic forces in the House in approving the conference agreement.

ISSUE WRIT TO STOP MURDER HEARING HERE

Claim Canadian Courts Have No Jurisdiction in Case of William Ferguson.
