BLACKBALLING OF BARON CAUSED REFORM CLUB ROW

Sir Edward Grey and Lewis Harcourt Also Threatened to Resign Because Churchill's Nominee Had Been Rejected—The Resignations Explained.

London, Feb. 4.—The family quarrel in the Reform Club, which led to the resignations of Lloyd George and Winston Churchill, two members of the cabinet, was due to the blackballing of a prominent Liberal member of parliament, who, according to the Daily Express, is Baron de Forest. He was either proposed or seconded by Mr. Churchill, and his rejection is said to have caused indignation among the members of the cabinet. The Express says Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, and Lewis Harcourt, the secretary for the colonies, also threaten to resign from the club unless a general meeting is called and the rejection rescinded. This can be done by a two-thirds majority. The rejection of a candidate for membership by a two-thirds majority is taken because of anything derogatory to his character.

FORCE OF POLICE WOMEN AND WOMEN'S COURT FOR TORONTO

Toronto, Feb. 4.—On Monday next at 10 o'clock No. 1 committee room at the city hall will be transformed into a courtroom. There Magistrate Denison will preside for a short while each day, but he will be the only man, except witnesses, allowed admission. The court will be called the women's court, where females who have transgressed will be tried hidden from the gaze of the usual court hangers-on.

SERVIANS SUFFER BY SORTIE FROM SCUTARI

Two Battalions Surprised and Captured by Turkish Governor.

Rome, Feb. 4.—The Turkish embassy here has a report to the effect that Essad Pasha, the Turkish commander at Scutari, aided by Albanians, surprised and captured two Serbian battalions, which he disarmed and paroled. He also captured 400 cartloads of provisions and ammunition. The reports that the Government has made overtures to capitulate are emphatically denied.

SIR WILFRID ILL

Has Severe Cold, But Is Expected Back in House in a Day or Two.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was confined to his house today with a severe cold. His illness is said to be not serious, and he is expected to be back in the House in a day or two.

WELSH BILL PASSED ON SECOND READING

Government Majority Dwindles to Twenty-Five Over Crucial Unionist Motion.

London, Feb. 4.—In the House of Commons tonight the Irish Nationalists again saved the Government from defeat on the Welsh disestablishment bill. A crucial Unionist motion on this measure was beaten only by 23 votes, the poll standing 249 to 226. Even with the Irish support, the Government would probably have suffered a reverse, but for the energy of one or two of its supporters, who spread out their speeches, while the whips were drumming up enough followers to insure a Government victory. There was little enthusiasm among the followers of the Government in favor of the bill; in fact, there was some opposition, and three Unionist members voted in favor of the Opposition amendment on this division. The bill was ultimately passed on its second reading.

SIR GORDON SPRIGG DEAD

Was Four Times Premier of Cape Colony.
Cape Town, Feb. 4.—Right Hon. Sir John Gordon Sprigg, who was four times premier of Cape Colony, died here today. He was born in 1839, and settled in Cape Colony in 1858. He was elected a member of the Colonial Parliament in 1869.

LIBERALS SHOW DANGER IN BILL

Opposition to Richelieu Capital Increase Develops in House.

THE MEASURE STANDS

Exception Chiefly Taken to Proposed Rights of Investment.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—Opposition met the Richelieu and Ontario Company's bill in the House today, and it was finally allowed to stand for consideration on a day when more time could be given to it. The bill permits the increase of the company's capital from ten to fifteen million dollars, and provides that the new capital may be invested as seems expedient. Mr. Lesperance (Montreal) explained that the money was needed for new ships and terminals.

This led Mr. Nesbitt (North Oxford) to point out that two large lake companies had merged, and to say that a merger with another corporation was now proposed.

Hon. Williams Pugsley took exception to the clause respecting the investment of the company's capital, and said that the clause might permit the Richelieu and Ontario Company to override the companies act by making loans to shareholders, which was prohibited, and by buying up other companies, which was also prohibited unless authorized by its charter.

Right Hon. R. L. Borden thought the first part of the bill regular, but the second part rather unusual. The second part, he thought, would be overruled by the companies act.

Mr. McKenzie, of Cape Breton, however, arose at this juncture and spoke until the hour for private bills had expired.

THIRTY MILLION LOSS BY MONTH LONG STRIKE

And No Sign of 150,000 New York Garment Workers Going Back.

New York, Feb. 5.—In the month since the strike of about 150,000 workers in the men's and boys' garmentmaking industry began here, a loss of \$30,000,000 has been borne by the manufacturers and their workmen, according to estimates published today. It is declared that more than one-tenth of the annual output of men's and youths' ready-made clothing, amounting to \$20,000,000, has been lost to the industry in this city, while the loss in wages to workmen is estimated at \$10,000,000. This does not include the losses incurred by the strikes in the women's garment industry.

MRS. WARWICK ACQUITTED

End of Her Sensational Trial on Charge of Murdering Husband.
Regina, Sask., Feb. 4.—Mrs. Amy Warwick was tonight acquitted by a jury of the murder of her husband. The jury was out an hour and a half. No trial of recent years excited greater interest in the province when it came before Chief Justice Haultain on Monday, by reason of many confessions alleged to have been made by the woman. She is about twenty-two years old, and was charged with complicity in the murder of Warwick, whose battered body was found in the stable on his farm last fall. It was charged that Mrs. Warwick had conspired with a man named Price to marry Warwick that she might get possession of his property after he had been put away by Price. Stanley Price, a local guide, was taken into the investigation into the death of Warwick was first instituted.
