


Montreal Department Hampered By Not Having Any Water.

Montreal, Jan. 1.—Seven families living in the two-storey apartments from No. 16 to No. 36 Louis square, which is within the water famine district were dispossessed this afternoon when a fire completely gutted three substantial residential structures.

It was forty minutes after the firemen arrived on the scene before a line of hose, nearly a mile long, sent the first dribbling stream into the flames. A second and a third stream followed in the next half hour, entailing the use of about 15,000 feet of hose.


