

USE CONNELL'S COAL SUGAR PRICES JUMP

Starch, Flour and Oatmeal Also Advance-War Prices Already Felt Here.

War prices are already being felt in London. Yesterday sugar was advanced in price 50 cents per hundred pounds. Fine granulated sugar now is \$5.15 a hundredweight, if you can obtain it in London. Several of the wholesalers are turning down orders with the explanation that there is no prospect of being able to fill them. One large wholesale house tried to order two carloads yesterday, but their orders were refused. Advances on all grades of sugar range from 50 cents to 60 cents a hundred-

weight. Local wholesalers strongly disclaim that they are in any way responsible for the advance in price. They are obliged to make on sales to their customers the same advance that the refineries have made to them, they say. Even at those prices, they cannot fulfill orders, because yesterday they could not get the sugar themselves at any

One wholesale man, in disclaiming any responsibility on the part of the wholesalers for the advance, pointed out that, although the Government had declared that it would not permit any dealers in provisions and food supplies to raise their prices, it had itself autoadvance 1,000,000 bags as a gift to the lows: British government. Part of the flour was purchased here in London,

Oatmeal had advanced 95 cents on every 90 pounds, and is now \$2.90 a bag. Starch has advanced half a cent a pound. Some soap firms are refusing orders, and others are quoting advanced prices.



[Canadian Press.] LONDON, August 11-10:50 p.m.-The Cunard liner Lusitania, which sailed from New York early Wednesday morning, arrived safely in the Mersey this evening.

MONTREAL, August 11 .- "The Ocean route is clear from Montreal to Liverpool, and any ship can sail when she pleases in perfect safety. This announcement was made today by R. S. White, collector of customs. The news had been sent him officially from Ottawa, and its result should be pronounced in the easing of insurance and exchange on cargoes, with the result that the wheat, now held in Montreal harbor, should speedily start on its way to Liverpool. In addition to this it will mean that for the present, at any rate, there will be little delay or difficulty in the sailing of passenger vessels from Montreal and Quebec.
