

## NEW LOCATION FOR WATERWORKS DAM

Change of Site Will Necessitate Preparation of New Plans.

## POLICE STAFF REDUCTION

Commissioners Have Not Renewed Appointments of Four Extra Men.

ST. THOMAS, April 20.—Another location has been selected for the big waterworks dam. The change from the original site will necessitate the preparation of new plans. This alteration in the preliminary work will delay the commencement of active operations for an indefinite period. The consulting engineer, W. E. Lee, Montreal, recommends the transfer of the storage area, but whether the construction of the plant on the new location may vary the cost, as provided in the first estimate, has not yet been determined.

**May Be Retired.**  
The four patrolmen, who were temporarily placed on the police force in January will retire from active duty during the month, unless the commissioners renew their appointments. Their night work was limited to the protection of sections of the city not included in the ordinary patrol of the regular staff, and their services appear to have been very effective, so far as crowding off disorderly people and keeping the streets clear of suspicious characters. It is possible that the men will be kept on the staff for another three months term, as the hobo migration from the other side of the line through this end of the province will start again within the next few weeks.

She furnished the lad with enough money to take him to Detroit on condition that her identity would remain unknown.

**Auto Bylaw Enforced.**  
Several of the much-travelled streets

are being given more than ordinary surveillance by the local police on account of many complaints coming in of the danger from speeding autos. As the spring season opens the police are finding that the fever is striking drivers with added possibilities for accidents, especially at street crossings. The police will enforce the law to the letter. A driver was fined \$5 this morning for moving over to the wrong side of the road.

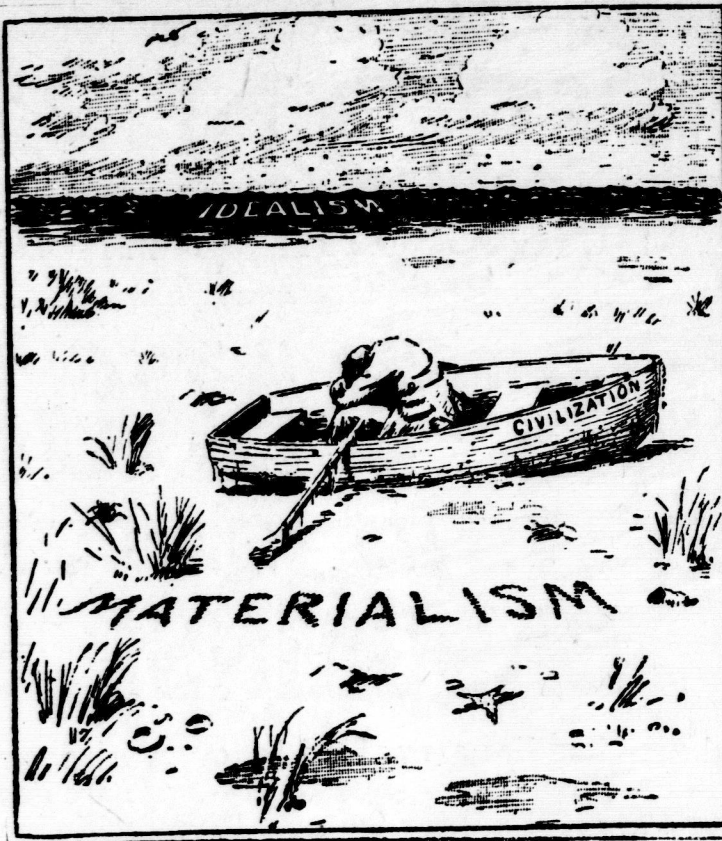

## Ontario Citizens Spend Over One Million Dollars In Montreal For Liquor

Dealers Declare Purchases Would Total \$20,000,000 If the Liquor Was Available—Several Dealers Report All Supplies Sold.

MONTREAL, April 20.—A prediction that approximately one million dollars will be spent in Montreal by Ontario buyers eager to delay the approaching drought before the province goes "dry" was made this morning. Never before have liquor dealers received such tremendous orders, and many of the most prominent in the city are already practically sold out. Three dealers were interviewed this morning, and from them it was learned that a single day's receipts amounted to \$50,000, \$30,000 and \$25,000, respectively. Some wholesalers say they are already refusing orders on account of their inability to fill them.

"Where the liquor available, Ontario would order about \$20,000,000 worth of all kinds of stuff," one of the dealers stated today. "There is not half that quantity in the province, however, and there are orders enough on hand now to use it all up. One can easily see, therefore, that the Ontario people who neglected to provide prior to Monday's voting will go dry a lot sooner than they expected."

## NO SIGN OF BOOTLEGGERS.

Those in the trade say there has been no sign of any bootleggers from Ontario coming here yet, although they are expected. However, they will have to act quickly and be prepared to pay more than the market price if they expect to get any stocks delivered before May 1. After that date every bottle in the province that is not in some one's private home will belong to the commission, and if anyone holds goods without declaring its quantity and whereabouts he will run grave

## GOVERNMENT IGNORES REPORT OF PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE ON D. S. C. R.

Hume Cronyn, M.P., Has Recommendation Reread into Minutes of Committee.

OTTAWA, April 20.—(Canadian Press).—The special committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment this morning reiterated its stand of last year that soldiers of all ranks should be on the same basis as civilians in the matter of training and pay and allowances during training and employment under the D. S. C. R. This was brought out by the discovery of the fact that the Government had not given effect to the original recommendation. Major N. F. Parkinson, deputy minister of the D. S. C. R., informed Hume Cronyn (London), chairman, to this effect, and Mr. Cronyn had the recommendation reread into the minutes.

Major Parkinson dealt at length with the proposals submitted by the G. W. V. A., and said that several of the allowances were already in effect. In this he was supported by Dr. W. C. Arnold, director of medical services of the D. S. C. R. Dr. Arnold was not prepared to admit that resistance to diseases was lessened by service in the army. Old age complications were sometimes mistaken as due to war service. In the majority of cases the soldiers were sincere.

Dr. J. W. Edwards (Frontenac) related a case in which he believed the patient would have been sick in any event.

## INVESTIGATING ALBERTA'S COAL FIELDS AND FUEL RESOURCES OF PROVINCE

OTTAWA, April 20.—(Canadian Press).—Alberta coal fields were again considered by the fuel committee of the House this morning. Prof. N. C. Pritchard of the University of Alberta was called and gave evidence on the different classes of Alberta coal. The Alberta Government, Prof. Pritchard said, was carrying on an extensive geological survey in the province. It was work which really came under the Federal Government, but the Federal Government had been unable to put in a survey this year, and the provincial authorities, realizing the importance of the work, had carried it on.

## CLAIM FOR DAMAGES BY STABBING ENTERED

Eight Cases on Docket For Non-Jury Supreme Court at Sarnia.

SARNIA, April 20.—Eight cases are listed on the docket for the non-jury sittings of the supreme court which open at the county court house here on Monday afternoon next, April 25, with Chief Justice Sir William Mulock presiding. The actions entered are varied and range from a claim for probate of a will to a suit for damages for injuries received by stabbing. In the latter case Peter Bayduk is the plaintiff, who seeks to recover an unstated amount from Ivan Turkovich, now serving a sentence in Kingston Penitentiary for wounding the plaintiff with a knife last year.

The two important cases are Phillip Henry Howse, plaintiff, in the second action, and administrator of the estate of his son, the late James Richard Howse, who died intestate on July 27, 1920, claims \$10,000 damages from Dr. F. J. James, medical practitioner, for alleged carelessness, negligence and gross want of skill in attending the said James R. Howse. Defendant denies the allegations of carelessness, etc., and alleges that negligence on the part of the said James Richard Howse contributed to his death. Meredith Fisher, London, are acting for the plaintiff, and Pardee, Burnham and Gurd for the defendant.

## WANDERER TO HANG JUNE 17; JUST LAUGHS

Sanity Experts Are Judge's Target.

Chicago, April 20.—Carl Wanderer slayer of his wife and "the ragged stranger," has been sentenced to be hanged on June 17 for the latter crime. Sentence was pronounced by Judge Joseph David. It was the first time the judge had sentenced a man to die. The motion for a new trial entered by Attorney W. A. Bartholomew was denied as soon as the attorney finished his argument. Assistant State Attorney Lloyd H. Hoth, who prosecuted Wanderer for the murder of "the ragged stranger," was not given an opportunity to present his case. "My mind is made up," said Judge David. "I have no quarrel with the decision of the jury who ordered the hanging of this man. That is unfortunate that so much conflicting evidence was introduced on the question of Wanderer's sanity. That, however, was a matter for the jury to decide. I have great confidence in the American jury system. The motion for a new trial is overruled."

**Will Appeal to Supreme Court.**  
Wanderer's lawyer announced he would appeal to the supreme court. Wanderer was then called. His face was bleached out by confinement in a murderers' row, but he appeared the picture of health.

You have been found guilty of murder by a jury," said Judge David. "Have you anything to say before I pronounce sentence?"

"No, I have nothing," said the defendant.

"Then I sentence you to be hanged until dead on June 17, between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. That's all I have to say to you."

"I want this case to go to the supreme court," said the judge.

"Well, we're going," snapped Attorney Bartholomew.

Wanderer broke into a broad grin when Attorney Bartholomew turned in his direction.

**Laughs Over Ruling.**  
He again broke into laughter a moment later, when Judge David announced that he would hear the ninety days for the filing of a bill of exceptions.

"Ninety days!" interrupted Attorney Bartholomew. "He's sentenced to be hanged in less than that."

Wanderer smiled at you with the gleam of his teeth. "It really takes longer than sixty days for you to prepare your record," Judge David said.

In answering Attorney Bartholomew's arguments, Judge David pointed out that eight prominent physicians testified that the defendant was sane, and that they were fairly equally divided in their opinions.

"Such a thing is a distressing," he declared. "The time has come that something must be done to prevent the procuring of medical testimony. It is deplorable."

The judge suggested the way out is to call disinterested experts. He said that he believed some of the experts were honest in their opinions, that it was also probable that others were dishonest and received pay for their testimony.

## T. AND L. COUNCIL ASKS WHY NO JOBS FOR LABOR MEN

Members of Other Classes Got All Positions Referendum Day.

ST. THOMAS, April 20.—The trades and labor council is demanding that it be informed why the chief election officers did not nominate a number of qualified labor men for the various appointments made in taking of the vote at the recent referendum. The trades and labor council feels annoyed over the apparent indifference shown by the election officers to the claim of the labor men.

It would appear as if the majority of the old and experienced deputy returning officers, who have had charge of their several stations at the last election, were not the best of the job. The trades and labor council naturally felt that they had been neglected, and as there are many deserving men looking for employment of any kind, they would have had the first choice. Why they were not appointed may possibly be explained by the chief election officers and the representatives of the employment bureau who waited on the election officers and asked for their appointments. It is understood that the allowance made for the deputy returning officers was \$7 for their services, \$4 for poll clerks and \$4 for constables. These sums are paid by the Government and may reach the appointees about next August.

## REBELS USE MACHINE GUN IN ATTACK ON TRAIN IN IRELAND

Guerilla Warfare Continues With Unabated Violence—Houses Burned in Reprisal.

DUBLIN, April 20.—Guerilla warfare in Ireland continues with unabated violence. Some of the cars of a train last evening between Gortalea, County Kerry and Castle Island, County Kerry, and subjected to machine-gun fire from a ruined building. But the attacking forces were driven off. The police suffered no casualties.

Nine houses in Tralee were bombed last night. These included the offices of the newspapers Kerrymen and Liberator, the printing machines of which were wrecked. There were no casualties. Several attacks on police barracks in various parts of the country are reported. At one place a fight raged for two hours, during which the court-house was burned down.

In reprisal for the killing of soldiers Sunday evening, several houses were destroyed at Ennis. Near Sally's Bridge, Dublin, soldiers returning to their barracks in lorries were fiercely attacked. They exchanged fire with their assailants, who apparently escaped unhurt.

**MUST NOT LEAVE IRELAND.**  
DUBLIN, April 20.—The Daily Eireann has declared that "the citizen of the republic shall leave Ireland without permission from the proper authority." Under the decree shipping and emigration agents henceforth are forbidden to

accept passage money or to issue tickets to intending Irish emigrants unless "they produce a printed permit signed by the minister for home affairs and sealed with the seal of the republic."

Persons disobeying these regulations will "be deemed guilty of a grave offence against the welfare of the state."

**NOT MUCH HARM DONE.**  
ST. CATHARINES, April 20.—Not only have the peaches come through the recent cold snaps and last Sunday's snowstorm, but there now appears a chance for at least a portion of the sour

cherries. Investigation shows that early Richmonds have withstood the storm and frosts with stems intact, and sufficient pollen to justify the expectation of their bearing fruit. Fear and apricot buds have undoubtedly sustained damage, but none of these trees appear to have been fully budded when the frosts and sleetstorm came along.
