TAKE FINAL VOWS AT SACRED HEART

Large Congregation Witnesses

Impressive Ceremony in City Edifice.

A congregation which filled the chapel of the Sacred Heart Convent to overflowing on Tuesday witnessed the solemn ceremony of taking of final vows by six novitiates, the taking of temporary vows by a third, and the receiving of seven young women to begin their five years' experience in the duties of the Sisters of St. Joseph, before pledging themselves to the life of sacrifice and poverty.

Those who received the holy habit were: Miss Woods, in religion Sister Mary Claudia; Miss Lynn, Sister Mary Edwina; Miss Warette, Sister Mary Benigna; Miss White, Sister Mary Bonaventure; Miss Doyle, Sister Mary Francesca; Miss Barry, Sister Mary Felicitas, and Miss Convent, Sister Mary Consolate.

Sister M. Fabian made temporary vows, Sister M. Wilfrid, Rose, George, Damian, Cosmas, St. George and Augusta pronounced their final vows. Right Reverend Monsignor O'Connor, vicar-general and administrator of the diocese, officiated, assisted by Rev. Father White, P.P., St. Columban, and Rev. Father Kelly, P.P., Mitchell.

Solemn high mass was celebrated by Rev. Father White, Chatham; Rev. Father Chisholm, London, deacon; Rev. Father O'Neill, Woodstock, sub-deacon; and Father O'Donnell, master of ceremonies.

Rev. Father Sholly, O.S.B., in an eloquent sermon, impressed the dignity and beauty of the religious life.

The postoffice officials have checked the contents of the bags and have found that over 100 registered letters have been stolen. The value of the missing packets is unknown at present.
