PROMINENT FARMER DIES IN HOSPITAL

Frederick Treadwell Had Lived For Many Years in Elgin County.

Frederick Treadwell, who was a well-known farmer in the St. Thomas district for several years prior to his taking up his residence in London, died this morning in Victoria Hospital after an illness of two weeks. Deceased was in his 65th year.

Mr. Treadwell was extremely popular in Elgin County, and before his retirement was classed as one of the most progressive farmers in the district, where he spent a good part of his life. Although he has lived in the Forest City for the past ten years he has taken a keen interest in agricultural matters and has followed closely the progress of the farming industry in Western Ontario. He was a member of the Independent Order of Foresters.

He is survived by one sister, Mrs. George McNeill, London, one brother, Charles, of Long Beach, California; a niece, Mrs. (Dr.) Wright of Smooth Rock Falls, Ontario, and a nephew, Colin, of Belleville.

The funeral will be held Wednesday from N. J. Griffith's funeral parlors. Services will be conducted at 2:30 by Rev. W. R. McIntosh of the Kings Street Presbyterian Church, and interment will take place in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

AGRICULTURIST WILL RECEIVE \$500 FROM PERTH

Stratford, June 11.—The controversial question concerning the appointment of the county agricultural representative was cleared up when the report of the finance committee was adopted. It recommended that the sum of \$500, as required by law, should be put in the bank to the credit of the representative.

CO-OPERATE WITH CHURCH IN RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

For some time there has been a course of Bible instruction in London's public schools, but it has been carried on independently of the churches. The new Bible memory course which will begin on September 1 will have the co-operation of the Sunday schools of the city. Every minister and clergyman in London has been asked by the school authorities to allow his Sunday school to work with the public schools in this work. The idea is that the passages of scripture to be read in school shall correspond with those read in the Sunday school. In this way there will be no overlapping and the children will have the passages explained and interpreted to them as they go along, which the school teacher is not allowed to do.
