Eastern States.

New York, Jan. 4.—The Adams papers per steamer California contain little news. A rumor at Lima says the U.S. steamer *Nyack* has gone to the Galapagos Islands with the intention of taking formal possession in the name of the United States.

The Postoffice Department has made permanent arrangements with the British Line to carry an English mail to Southampton and a German mail to Bremen on Saturday. The Hamburg line will for the present carry the French mail every Saturday, while the Williams & Guion line will carry the mails from Queenstown every Wednesday.

ALBANY, Jan. 4.—The Legislature organized to-day by the choice of the Democratic nominees for Speakers in both branches. Resolutions were introduced in the Senate by Tweed for the repeal of the XVth Amendment.

Gov. Hoffman's Message was read in both branches. He says: The sinking fund will extinguish the State debt, at the present rate, in 10 years. The interest on the debt should be paid in coin. He devotes considerable space to the canal, and urges such legislation as will insure cheap transportation, and speaks of the contract system of labor in prisons, calls attention to the public charities of the State and commends them as the liberality of the Legislature; recommends a number of general laws and the avoidance of special legislation.

New York, Jan. 5.—The telegraph operators of 50 principal cities are now on a strike on account of alleged reduction of the wages of two operators in San Francisco. Nearly all the operators, male and female, in this city have joined the strike. Business has not been stopped, only retarded. The Western Union telegraph operators struck yesterday afternoon, nearly all leaving work.

The Company says there is no ground in the fact charged for the strike, and that no salaries have been reduced, but they can form no combination or organization of men to dictate who or how many persons they should employ for the transaction of their business; that they approve the action of Mumford in reply to the proposition of the operators, viz., that members and telegraphers of their organization who had already stopped work might be restored to their former positions in the Company's employ, in which he declined to act for want of official knowledge.

The operators, in every part, have struck, and the force of command is sought to perform the service. The operators last night adopted a card to their brethren throughout the country, asking unity of action.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 4.—The first regular meeting of the Cabinet since the recess of Congress when held to-day. All the members were present.

A colored child having been admitted to one of the public schools yesterday seven white children were, in consequence, withdrawn by their parents.

Minister Jones has received his final instructions from the State Department and will leave New York to-morrow evening for the latter city for China via California next Saturday.

Considerable interest is felt in army circles concerning the contemplated change in the assignment of officers, whereby several who have been for years on duty in different bureaus of the War Department will be sent to posts in the West, while many now serving on the frontier and at other stations will be assigned to duty in this locality.

St. Louis, Jan. 3.—The strike among the telegraph operators here does not materially disturb or retard the business in this section. Six hours after the strike the office was competently manned. Yesterday and to-day, not only was there a full force of first-class operators on duty, but the Superintendent of this district has given a space, who will go to any point where their services will be needed. The strikers published a card to-day, banding the Telegraph Company severely; charging them with a design to reduce salaries generally, and thereby make the operators bear a portion of the costs of the war between them and the opposition line. Privately the strikers acknowledge that their action was premature, but the step being taken they will stand by it, regardless of consequences.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The situation of affairs relative to the telegraph strike continues unchanged. The office here is supplied with a full force of operators and is continually receiving new applications for stations. The officers of the company are fully confident of their ability to fill the places of all strikers with competent men, and declare their intention to employ some of those engaged in the movement.

St. Louis, Jan. 7.—There was a large meeting at the Southern Hotel last night to consider the Capitol removal question. The Chairman was authorized to appoint two committees to visit Washington and use all their influence in getting the removal question before Congress, and especially to press

vent further appropriations for government buildings at Washington. Letters from Congressmen were read stating there was a Congressional organization at Washington among members and it is constantly increasing, whose purpose is to defeat appropriations generally and to agitate the removal question.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 7.—Gov. Wainwright's Message congratulates the Legislature upon the flourishing condition of public affairs and the good feeling existing between the people of both races.

URUGUAY, Jan. 7.—The *Advertiser*, special says there will probably be some startling revelations regarding some of Johnson's revenue officers at New York. A partial examination shows that the accounts of one of the Collectors will probably be short \$300,000.

MADRID, Jan. 5.—The resignation of the Spanish Cabinet in consequence of Italy's refusal to permit the candidature of the Duke of Gesa is announced. It is reported that Admiral Lopez will return to the Ministry.

PARIS, Jan. 4.—It is reported that the new Ministry will declare for and accept the programme of the Right Centre. The Ministers were received this evening by the Empress who gave them a very gracious welcome.

The *Partie* publishes some correspondence between Olivier and Pierre Magne, to prove that the latter advised the admission of members of the right and left centres in the Ministry.

MADRID, Jan. 4.—The ministerial crisis continues, and telegrams from Florence announce the negative of Italy. It was reported on Sunday but its publication was suspended by authority until to-day.

For two days the government has been in a state of indecision as to their course. The Duke of Montpensier was expected to arrive here this morning but his friends have telegraphed that he cannot come on account of the situation created by the action of Italy.

LISBON, Jan. 4.—The mail steamer from Rio Janeiro Dec. 11th brings the following from Paraguay: "Igualia was taken by the allies without resistance. Lopez had been driven from the soil of Paraguay. Prince D'Or and Senor Paranhos were expected at Montevideo, on their return from the seat of war. The former could reach Buenos Ayres about the first January." According to the

very latest accounts the war in Paraguay was at an end and Lopez has fled to Bolivia with his family. An agreement had been signed between Brazil and the Argentine Confederation according to which Brazil will withdraw 14,000 men from Paraguay. The entire contingent of the confederacy will retire.

ROME, Jan. 4.—A general congregation of the council was held at the Quirinal yesterday. The Pope was not present and the cardinal presiding by right of age announced the recent death of four Cardinals and the appointment of Cardinal Bites as president of the Commission of Dogmas and of Cardinal Catinelli as president of the commission on ecclesiastic discipline was promulgated. The council is to session again to-day; the business of the organization continues.

London, Jan. 5.—The bullion in the Bank of England has decreased £10,000 since last week.

The extract from Mrs. Stowe's Lady Byron memorandum, containing 1181 words, was posted by the Anglo-American Atlantic Telegraph Company and published in the *Post-Mat Gazette* to-day. DUBLIN, Jan. 6.—Irish journals report that during the Parliamentary election in London, which was bitterly contested and attended with great excitement, the supporters of Martin, the Fenian candidate, and those of Nugent, had a sharp fight. The troops appeared and fired upon the Fenians, who quickly dispersed. A few men were wounded but none killed. At least accounts there had been no more disturbance, but measures have been taken to prevent a renewal of the conflict.

MADRID, Jan. 5.—The Imperialists state that two pistol shots were fired at Serrano to-day without effect.

London, Jan. 6.—The residence of Mr. Motley, the American Minister at London was entered by burglar last night and robbed to the value of over £1,000.

SOUTHAMPTON, Jan. 5.—The steamship West Philadelphia has arrived on her way to Hamburg.

PALM, Jan. 6.—Advices have been received from Florence which indicate that on the opening of the Italian chambers there will be ministerial changes in favor of the left centre party.

MOSCOW, Jan. 6.—The Anti-Persian party have a considerable majority of the new Board of Trade.

London, Jan. 6.—A correspondent of the *Morning Post* writing from the Suez Canal says that anything drawing over fifteen feet of water must be lightened in order to pass through the Suez Canal. Dredges are to be used to clear the passage.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Mr. William Douglas has issued a challenge to the world to race his yacht Sophie to Sandy Hook on the 4th of July next.

PARIS, Jan. 8.—Correspondents from Rome ridicule the story extenuatively prevailing that Pio, Syracus, upon appealing to the Ecclesiastical Council, was not heard nor recognized.

It is announced to-day on the best authority that the French Ambassador at London and Berlin have resigned.

It is rumored that the Ministry will propose a reduction in the contingent force of 75,000 or 100,000 men.

M. Olivier to-day received the Magistrates of Paris in a body.

Yesterday there was an important reunion of Ministers at the Ministry of Justice.

A circular has been sent by the Emperor's Minister of the Interior to the Presidents of Departments, making known the policy of the Government. It is further stated that the document is very liberal.

MADRID, Jan. 8.—Nothing is settled here concerning the Ministry. There is much political excitement throughout the country.

BONN, Minister to the Emperor, advised that they must conform strictly to their statistics to avoid such misfortune as that of the credit. Mobilier informed them that the Ministry of Finance will keep up relations as heretofore with great financiers. The ministry have decided that Algeria shall be represented in the Corps Legislatif by four deputies. Permission has been accorded for the sale of all journals in the streets all foreign journals are henceforth to be distributed without examination by the Bureau of censorship.

OTTAWA, Canada, Dec. 30.—Vice-Chancellor Sprague has been sworn in as Chancellor of the Court of Chancery.

The Cabinet has formally decided to recall Gov. McDougal. He is expected here in the course of a week.

MONTREAL, Dec. 29.—A heavy shock of earthquake is reported at the city of St. Paul, forty miles below Quebec. It lasted one minute.

MONTREAL, Dec. 28.—The *Star* alleges that enormous frauds have been committed recently in a private bonded warehouse at Montreal by the coalition of officials and it calls upon the Minister of Finance to cause a thorough investigation.

MEXICO, Mexico City, Dec. 20.—Seward and party, yesterday, were at Fiascola, visiting the historic remains for which that place is celebrated. To-morrow they visit the monument of Cholula, and will go next to Orizaba, where they will arrive on the 23rd. Minister Nelson accompanies the party on this excursion. Seward said for Vera Cruz for Havana on an English steamer Jan. 2d.

WEST INDIES, Jan. 5.—Jose Crespo and Jose Robo, convicted of an attempt to incite rebellion among the Catalonian volunteers, were sentenced and garroted on Christmas day.

The news of the lease of the bay of Samsa to the United States caused intense excitement among the people.

The San Domingo revolutionists are making arrangements to overthrow Baez before the American Congress ratifies the lease. Baez's troops have taken Cartel Villa and two of Cabral's

generals who were captured were executed.

Reports from St. Thomas say the negotiations for the cession of St. Thomas

and Santa Cruz to the U. S. have been reopened.

Advices from Hayti to the 9th Dec. are received. Salvage now holds only the city of Port au Prince.
