SHEEP INSPECTION TO BE ENFORCED

Local butchers yesterday were disturbed over the enforcement of the regulation requiring the inspection of sheep imported for domestic consumption, says the Vancouver News-Advertiser. Hitherto the regulation has not been strictly enforced, but owing to the danger of sheep each and other diseases being introduced locally, through the neglect to inspect imported animals, Dominion Veterinary Inspector Hopkins received word on Thursday that the regulation is to be carried out. Two hundred and fifty sheep, imported from Oregon, were due to arrive on the steamer Mainlander yesterday, and the inspector was on hand at the docks, accompanied by Dr. Hart, V. S., at the usual hour of the steamer's arrival. The inspector had delayed the steamer and the veterinary surgeon returned to Dr. Hart's office, where they had other work to attend to. At 11:30 a. m. Dr. Hopkins again visited the dock, but the steamer was still absent. In the meantime he had notified that two carloads of sheep, entered via Blaine, Wash., had arrived at Everett. The steamer Mainlander, on the Great Northern line, was accordingly hurried home to take lunch so as to be free to attend to these duties. On the arrival at his office he found some important matters connected with a cattle disease called "Red Water" that is at present engaging the attention of the Agriculture Department, which also required prompt attention. 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Russia Still Building Forts

Fortifications on Yung-an-phi Proceeding and Heavy Guns to Be Mounted.

Japanese in Consultation With Railways as to Moving Troops.

(London, Oct. 23.—In a despatch to the Daily Mail, the correspondent of that paper at Peking, publishes a statement made October 19th that the Russians are fortifying Yung-an-phi, a strategic point on the Great Wall, and are preparing to mount heavy guns there. The Japanese government, the correspondent continues, is conferring with the Chinese government as to the most speedy mobilization of the army whenever this becomes necessary. The Tientsin correspondent of the Daily Mail says, in a despatch that she will occupy some points in Chinese territory if Russia wants to evacuate Manchuria.

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
