The Case of Mendric vs Grand Truth Rail-way at last focures a Mearing-Open-ing of the Case Testerday. The celebrated case of Hendrie vs. the Grand Trunk to decide who shall control the Toronto, Grey and Bruce railway, which has been pending for about a year and a half without being heard, came up at the chancery divisional court yesterday morn-ing before Judge Proudfoot. Mr. Dalton Mc-Carthy, Q. C., Mr. C. Robinson, Q.C. and Mr. E. Martin appeared for Mr. Hendrie, and Hon. E. Blake and Mr. Cassels for the Grand Trunk The pleadings set forth that the company was in difficulties in 1874, failure following endeavours to resuscitate the company's affairs, and allege that Mr Beatty, in April, 1881, was making a secret agreement with the Grand Trunk railway company with the object of leasing the Toronto, Grey and Bruce railway to that company at a rental, and upon terms far below the value of the line. The plaintiff Hendrie protested against this agreement, and de-sired at a meeting of the board of directors of the Toronto company to have the cousideration of the question postponed, but a majority of the directors refused, resisted the delay and insisted on the terms of the agreement being carried out. The proposal of the Grand Trunk was that they should have the line on the following terms: A rental of 274 per cent of the gross earnings up to \$500,000; 25 per cent of all the gross earnings from \$400,000 to \$500,000, and 124 per cent for all over \$500,000, and 125 per cent of all over \$500,000, and 126 per cent for all over \$500,000, and 127 per cent for all over \$500,000. Certain works were also to be performed by the Grand Trunk. The plaintiff alleges that these terms were most unfavorable. The North ern railway company then made an offer of 35 per cent on the gross earnings up to \$350,009, 25 per cent for the next \$500,000. 20 per cent for the next \$100,000 and 125 per cent for all over \$500,000 The proposal was rejected, however, and an agreement was entered into on the 13th of May. At a meeting of bondholders held on the 28th June 1881, to raily the agreement, it is contended that the plaintiff was not permit-ted to vote on account of the bonds he held. He also charges that the agreement was the instigation of the defendant and without independent legal advice or due considera-tion, and it was unfair and unjust to the plaintiffs in its terms and that it should not be enforced igainst the plaintiffs, and that the said agreement is of such a nature the delay and insisted on the terms of the
