Those wishing to qualify for any one or all of these routes can do so, but when coasting is intended a thorough knowledge of all lights, etc., on the route is required. The will and its codicils cover more than 700 papers of closely written legal cap, and bequeath \$10,000,000 to twenty-seven bequeath \$ direct heirs.
