The Montrealers expect to put on several more for the match in Toronto in two weeks for the championship.

The Toronto baseball club and the Bay-sides of Hamilton will play on the Jarvis street grounds to-morrow afternoon.

The Wasp, Capt. Pringle of Chicago, will race the Toronto club at Milwaukee Saturday.

The wrestling match between "Jo" Aton and the "Jap" at Cincinnati on Friday, was won by the former in three out of five.

A baseball match Saturday between the Princess of Hamilton and the Atlantic of Toronto resulted in favor of the former by a score of 6 to 0.

Domick McCaffrey, middle weight champion of America, knocked John Remie, the Scotch champion, out in one round at New York Saturday.

He was at once responded to. A dozen men with vengeance in their eyes and rifles in their hands, set out in search of the wretch. They traced Wagon to the woods and are still looking for him. The young woman lies in a very precarious condition.

Lebo Village Torn Up by a Cyclone.

LONDON, July 5.—Lobo village, about eight miles west of this town, was struck by a violent hurricane yesterday evening. It did great damage. Houses were blown down and trees uprooted. The roof and rear portion of Mr. Irvine's house was demolished, as was also the stable and workshop of T. R. Powell. Mr. John Salway's blacksmith shop, filled a carriage and a horse and wagon. The carriage was blown into the air and the horse and wagon were crushed. A great many of the people took refuge in the cellars, which accounts for no loss of life.

Blinded by Powder.

GUELPH, July 5.—A lad named Ferguson, aged about 17 years, who lives near Salway's blacksmith shop, filled a cartridge shell with powder, and ignited a fuse attached to the charge. As the cartridge did not explode, he thought the light had gone out, and he stepped up to see. While looking straight into the hole the cartridge discharged, the contents lodging in his face and blinded him. After it was dead he was carried to the hospital, where it is thought he will recover his sight again.

A Big Bear.

A Boy and a Cow Killed.

Death of an Allan Line Captain.

Montreal, July 5.—Capt. Joseph E. Dutton of the Allan steamship Sardinian died in the general hospital here today of Bright's disease, aged 57.

Two Boys Drowned.

SHERBROOK, Que., July 5.—Two young lads, one a son of Thomas Bown the other a son of Mr. Severance, were drowned last evening in Massawippi river at Lennoxville.

Rolling Stock Seized.

QUEBEC, July 5.—The Mercury says that the rolling stock of the North Shore railway has been seized and is announced to be forfeit to the bailiff.

OTTAWA, July 5.—Charles Smith, of Campbellford, Ont., has made application for a divorce from his wife on ground of adultery.

Destructive Storm in Illinois.

CHICAGO, July 5.—Despatches from central Illinois report a severe storm Saturday. In Sangamon county several farm houses were badly damaged, and crops ruined. Loss over \$100,000. In Macon county a dozen dwellings were wrecked. Two of John Kraft's children were badly injured. The wind lifted loaded cars off the track at Boonville station. The loss in Macon county is estimated at \$300,000. Christian county is said to have suffered severely.

A Cattle Man Murdered.

Dodge City, July 6.—R. E. Scholtz, of Gollis, Texas, was killed this morning in a quarrel with Dave S. Clair, a gambler. Scholtz is a member of the cattle firm of Bown & Scholtz, who have 6000 head of cattle on this market. The excitement qualified Guy on the night of the killing, and gave the race to Fisherman. Scholtz was given second place, Loup third. All bets declared off.
