### THE JESUIT ESTATES BILL.

#### THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT DECIDES NOT TO INTERFERE.

Lord Stanley Accepts an Invitation to the Conference Board at Ottawa. The Grand Trunk's Proposed Loop Line.

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—A few days since it was stated in this correspondence that there was no truth in the rumor industriously circulated in the Opposition newspapers that the Jesuit Estates Bill had been disallowed. The World is now in a position to announce on authority that the bill has been disallowed by the Dominion Government, and it has been decided that the bill, being one coming entirely within the jurisdiction of the Provincial Legislature, should not be interfered with by the Dominion Government, and it will not, therefore, be disallowed.

The bill, which is the subject of the Grand Trunk's proposed loop line, is one that will be of great benefit to the Province, and it is to be regretted that it will not be allowed to pass.

### THE GRAND TRUNK REACHING OUT.

# THE TERRIBLE GERMANS

## AMERICAN CITIZENS IN SAMOA ROUGHLY HANDLED.

The Stars and Stripes Torn Down—United States Citizens Stabbed in the Street—An English Boat's Crew Shot at Secretary Bayard Takes the Story.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—The steamer Alameda arrived here yesterday morning from Samoa, and a correspondent writing from Apia under date of Jan. 6, says: A serious case of affairs exists in Samoa. On the night of Dec. 18 some sailors from the German man-of-war Adler, Ota and Eber attacked Matafua's soldiers under direction of the German consul and killed Captain Brits, the senior German naval officer in port. As a result of the encounter 22 German sailors were killed and 32 wounded. Since then the German war-ships have burned the American houses, torn down the United States flag, seized some American citizens in central water, and taken American men-of-war. A boat's crew from a German vessel in command of an officer have shot at the captain and lieutenant of an English man-of-war.

On the night of Dec. 16 a party of 180 German sailors came ashore at Apia, and their United States Marshal George Scanlan and his brother George in the back and ran through the streets attacking all persons they met except the Germans, and injured the adherents of Matafua, among the number being native women and children. Some of Matafua's soldiers carried the boat and were ordered to begin shooting. They were urged by United States Consul Blacklock not to fire.

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The United States steamship Nipala steamed to the Samoa Islands on Tuesday afternoon. The German war-ships were going to shell Matafua's stronghold. Captain Muller had been ordered to shell Matafua's stronghold and entered his protest against the reported project. His protest was not taken notice of, however, for the Germans are in the habit of ignoring the protests of the United States.

Secretary Bayard Interviewed.  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—A copy of the dispatch from San Francisco in regard to Matafua's stronghold and the American flag at Samoa by German soldiers, was shown to Secretary Bayard. He said the dispatch was a gross misstatement of the facts and that the German soldiers were not in the habit of ignoring the protests of the United States.
