THE TERRIBLE GERMANS

AMERICAN CITIZENS IN SAMOA ROUGHLY HANDLED.

The Stars and Stripes Torn Down-United States Citizens Stabbed in the Street-States Citizens Stabbed in the Street An English Bont's Crew Shot at—Secr-tary Bayard Takes the Story Coolly. San Francisco, Jan. 20.—The steamer lameda arrived here yesterday morning rom Samoa. A correspondent persons state of affairs exists in Samoa. On the night of Dec. 18 some sailors from the German men-of-war Adler, Olsa and Eber attacked Mataafa's soldiers under direction of the German consul and Captain Fritz, the senior German naval officer in port.
