The paper of A. MacNeil, chief of the Fruit Division of the Department of Agriculture, as published in a recent issue of the Morning Chronicle, appears in this issue of the Monitor-Sentinel. Mr. MacNeil evidently sums up the advantages and disadvantages of fruit-growing in Nova Scotia and concludes with the statement that the advantageous situation of this province, with prospects for successful co-operation in marketing her crops entitles her to first place in the Dominion.

Among the disadvantages as compared with other fruit-growing districts he refers to the necessity for heavy applications of fertilizers as a peculiar condition of the soil of this province. As a remedy and offset for the fertilizer bill he suggests a system of mixed farming to include stock for the purpose of furnishing sufficient fertilizer to maintain the fertility of the soil, making apples the main crop. The reduction of the fertilizer bill and necessity for cold storage and co-operation in marketing he concludes would give Nova Scotia the most lucrative apple industry in the Dominion, if not in the world.


