dogs flesh are accompanied with a small Oorakin full of the oil or fat of feal, or of elk's greafe, if this feaft is given at the melting-time of the fnow. Everv one has his own difh before him, in which he fops his flesh before he eats it. If the fat be hard, he cuts a fmall piece of it to every bit of flefh he puts into his mouth, which ferves as bread with us. At the end of this fine regale, they drink as much of the oil as they can, and wipe _ their hands on their hair. Then come in the wives of the master and perfons invited, who carry off their husbands plates, and retire together to a feparate place, where they difpatch the remains.

After grace being faid by the oldeft of the company, who also never fails of pronouncing it before the meal, the master of the treat appears as if buried in a profound contemplation, without speaking a word, for a full quarter of an hour; after which, waking as it were out of a deep sleep, he orders in the *Calu*mets, or Indian pipes, with tobacco. First he
