

(a) There is something to be said for 4 Kt to B 3, 5 Kt takes B, Kt takes Kt, 6 Kt takes P, Q to K 2, 7 P to Q 4, or P to K B 4, P to Q 3. If 5 P to B 3, then B to K 2.

(b) We favour P to B 3

(c) Either Castling or B to K 3 is superior, and the sme may be said of P to K R 3.

(d) P to K Kt 4 commands our preference.

(c) This formidable stroke demands White's utmost


