Donovan, of Pembroke, brother of the  
deceased, was the celebrant.

PRESIDENT Cleveland has appointed  
James Phelan, of Detroit, Mich., as col-  
lector of customs for the first Michigan  
district. The A. P. A.'s of the Wolverine  
State, whose headquarters are in Det-  
roit, are terribly upset by the appoint-  
ment of a "Romanist," and make dire  
threats to defeat the Democratic party at  
the next national election.

In Chicago an organization has been  
instituted to aid in the movement for a  
true Sunday's rest. The means whereby  
they hope to gain their object is by  
pledging themselves not to make any  
purchases on Sunday. This organiza-  
tion is the result of the Chicago confer-  
ence on Sunday rest, in which Catholics  
and Protestants worked together. Many  
merchants who have hitherto kept their  
doors open on Sunday are supporting the  
movement.

brought before the grand jury of Erie  
county at its next session. The charge  
to be preferred against them is con-  
spiracy. No doubt the grand jury is  
packed, just as the jury lists of New-  
port, R. I., were packed, by members of  
the order. But it is worth while to try

the experiment of obtaining a judicial  
review of the purposes and operations of  
this dark-lantern organization.

SAYS an exchange, news has been  
brought to Seattle, W. T., a few days ago  
of the birth of the first white child in  
the wilderness of the Yukon river. It  
was born last spring to Mrs. P. Beau-  
mont, wife of the keeper of a trading  
post at the outlet of the Porcupine river,  
within the Arctic circle and almost on  
the eastern border of the territory. Mrs.  
Beaumont is the only white woman  
that ever crossed the Chilean mountains  
and descended the Yukon. The first  
unmarried white woman to penetrate  
any considerable distance up the Yukon  
was Miss Mellen, who took charge of an  
Indian school at Fort Mile Creek last  
spring.

This clear, cold weather is good for the  
health and good for business. It brings

buoyant bearing. It also lends buoy-  
ancy to the flannel and coal markets,  
and makes the snow-shovel a necessary  
adjunct of every well-regulated house-

COUNT DE ROFFIGNAC, a French noble-  
man, representing foreign stockholders  
who are interested in a number of plan-  
tations in Chicot county, Ark., arrived  
at Little Rock, Arkansas, Thursday last  
from New York. He has made a propo-  
sition to the board of penitentiary com-  
missioners to work 4,000 acres of the  
company's lands on shares, the state to  
pay for feeding, guarding and clothing  
of the convicts and receive one half the  
profits. It will require 300 convicts to  
carry on the work. The state will prob-  
ably accept the proposition. Count de  
Roffignac, was for three or four years a  
resident of Whitewood, Assa., where he  
established a chicory plantation and also  
elaborated a scheme for an extensive  
beet root sugar factory which fell  
through after the company had been  
organized and the capital subscribed,  
owing to some unforeseen obstacle. The  
count left this country a couple of years

ago for New York, where he intended  
joining some wealthy French gentle-  
men in the manufacture of sugar. He  
has evidently drifted back to his plan-  
tation schemes.

Religious persecution continues to be  
the order of the day under the sway of  
the Czar. A telegram from Varsovia  
says: Twenty-two Catholic priests of the  
province of the Vistula have been de-  
prived of their offices.

**C. M. B. A. NOTES.**  
**SOME NOTEWORTHY STATISTICS.**

The lives of 1,300,000 were insured  
last year in the Fraternal Associations.  
Over \$31,500,000 was paid in 1893 to  
widows and orphans by the Fraternal  
Beneficiary Associations of the United  
States.

Think of the enormous sum of \$31,500,-  
000 devoted to charity in one year, and  
then thank the C. M. B. A. and its  
sister societies, engaged in this good  
work.

Two of the three new members of the  
pension examining board for Wayne  
Co., Mich., including Detroit, are C. M.  
B. A. men, and medical examiners.  
They are Dr. Wiciezinski and Dr. John  
P. Corcoran.

Branch number one of the Quebec  
Council of the C. M. B. A., located in  
Montreal, recently initiated eight new  
members and by ballot admitted eleven  
others, all at one meeting. Surely an  
excellent job of work for one day, and  
an earnest of future success.

The Catholic Mutual Benefit Associa-  
tion was established in 1876 and at the  
beginning of 1892 had a membership of  
33,341, which is an increase of 3,857  
over 1891. The total expense for man-  
agement is \$8,047, or 11.05 for each  
\$1,000 paid in benefits. The C. M. B. A.  
has a reserve fund of \$150,000.
