H. R. H. the Duchess of Connaught Expresses Gratitude for Coats and Oilskins.

GOODS DISTRIBUTED

Admiral Hornby Says Men Very Thankful and Glad of Clothing.

H. R. H. the Duchess of Connaught desires thru the medium of the press to thank all those who have so kindly and generously contributed to her fund to provide oilskins and rubber boots for the men of the North Atlantic squadron, and to inform them that she is now closing the fund as \$118.05 has been received. Three hundred pairs of sea boots and twenty down oilskins, costing \$2185, have already been purchased and sent to Rear Admiral Hornby.

The royal highness has now sent the balance, \$2080.05, to Admiral Hornby, as she thinks that it can be expended to the best advantage of the blue-jackets by the sea.

Admiral Hornby has written to her royal highness to say that the oilskins and sea boots have been received and distributed. He adds that they have been much appreciated by the men, and that he would like to express their grateful thanks to all those who have contributed.

LARGE ATTENDANCE WHEN HOUSE OPENS

Novel Proceedings Will Draw Crowds to Legislature Today.

ELECT NEW SPEAKER

Lieutenant-Governor Will Retire While Dr. Jamieson Takes Chair.

With the roar of guns and fanfare of trumpets the Ontario Legislature will open today, and the launching of the war session will be distinguished with all the brilliancy of the past.

It is understood that the speech from the throne will make special mention of the calling of the members in a moment of unusual empire crisis. Attention will be drawn to the necessity of increased production, financial conditions arising out of the war operation of the workmen's compensation act, extension of the hydro-electric system, and improvement of highway measures affecting the revenue, the question of mortgage foreclosure, liquor license law and boiler inspection will also be foreshadowed.

FRENCH CHARGE ON SKIS INTO GERMAN TRENCH

Forty Alpine Chasseurs and Two Officers Put Up Stiff Fight Against Captors.

GENEVA, Feb. 14, via Paris, Feb. 15.—What is said to be the first bayonet charge on skis during the present war was made yesterday in the Vosges Mountains, near Col du Bonhomme. Forty Alpine Chasseurs with two officers were cut off by the Germans and were ordered to surrender. They covered, slope on their skis into the German trenches, where a terrible struggle took place before the French soldiers were overcome.

BANQUET PLANNED FOR BIG CONGRESS

Toronto Will Formally Welcome Good Roads Convention in March.

VISITORS SEE MAYOR

Mayor Church Suggests Provision of City Dinner for Delegates.

Mayor Church gave audience at the city hall yesterday to officials of the Canadian International Good Roads Congress and welcomed them on behalf of the city. When the convention opens in March the mayor and the city council will attend the first meeting in abody and will present the keys of the city to the visitors. President W. A. McLean, provincial highway engineer, will inform the delegates that they are guests, and that special entertainment will be provided them.

At the suggestion of Mayor Church a huge smoker and banquet will be tendered, and the 2000 visitors will be officially welcomed. Representatives of the Ontario Government, including Premier Hurst, will be invited to address the gathering, and the occasion promises to be one of importance.
