### LARGE ATTENDANCE WHEN HOUSE OPENS

Novel Proceedings Will Draw Crowds to Legislature Today.

### ELECT NEW SPEAKER

Lieutenant-Governor Will Retire While Dr. Jamieson Takes Chair.

### A LAST DAY CROWD.

With the roar of guns and fanfare of

trumpets the Ontario Legislature will

open today, and the launching of the

war session will be distinguished with

all the brilliance of the past.

The novelty of welcoming a new speaker, governor, premier, a new speaker is ex-

pected to draw a much larger crowd

than usual, and special arrangements

are being made to accommodate the

guests.

It is understood that the speech

from the throne will make special men-

tion of the members in

moment of unusual empire crisis.

Attention will be drawn to the neces-

sity of increased production, financial

conditions arising out of the war op-

eration of the workmen's compensation

act, extension of the hydro-electric

system and improvement of highways

in the province. It is likely that sev-

eral measures affecting the revenue,

the question of mortgage foreclosure,

liquor law and other inspection

will also be considered.

Under Guard of Honor.

A marked departure from preced-

ence will be made in the use of a guard

of honor drawn from the 19th Battalion

of the Royal Canadian Dragoons.

They will form the escort as usual.

In electing the new speaker the

Lieutenant-governor will retire from

the chamber to allow the nomination

of the speaker by the members of the

assembly.

He will then be seated in the chair.
