## AT THE THEATRES

#### At the Royal Alexandra

"The Chocolate Soldier." Not for a long time has there been a more taking production of its class than "The Chocolate Soldier," as given at the Royal Alexandra last night.

Compared with the ordinary opera bouffe, with which it is frankly classed, its superiority is unmistakable. Whether as regards story, dialog or music, this is not surprising, since it is based on George Bernard Shaw's "Arms and the Man," and the librettists have therefore had all the advantages accruing from that original dramatist's cynical and paradoxical humor and stage experience. Add to that the musical genius of Oscar Straus and the skillful adaptation of Stanislaus Stange, and together the public have a combination than which none can be better fitted to arrest and hold public attention.

The scene is laid in Bulgaria, with which the neighboring country of Serbia is at war. All the able-bodied men are at the front, and for a time long enough to prompt the Bulgarian women to bewail their loneliness. So, when a soldier bursts into Nadina Popoff's room at night, she is naturally alarmed, but when she finds he is a soldier non-combatant seeking shelter, she discovers her secret, assist in his disguise and each seizes a favorable opportunity to place her photograph in his pocket.

Then the victorious army returns and Major Alexis Spriford of the Bulgarian army claims his bride. Meantime the Swiss "The Chocolate Soldier" has met both Nadina and her chocolate soldier are finally united. The story has been provided with fine illustrative and taking melodies, admirably fitted to show the capacity of the vocal and orchestral talent. As Nadina, Miss Alice Yorke, a Toronto girl, whose advance has been watched and entirely appreciated, made a distinguished success, earned by merit, not sympathy. Miss Yorke has made extraordinary but thoroughly well-deserved progress, and the tributes accorded her were sincere testimony to exceptional talent. She was well supported by an all-round good company, notable among whom were Miss Fritz von Busing, as Marsha, and Miss Frances Kennedy, as Aurelia Popoff. Both sang and acted with marked charm and grace.

Forrest Huff, as the chocolate soldier, showed himself the possessor of a fine and well cultivated tenor voice, and Francis J. Boyle, as Capt. Massakoff, Fred Mac, as Col. Popoff, and Henry Cote, as Major Alexis, were all excellent. The scenery and stage setting were of unusual beauty and the minor roles and incidental were all of exceptional charm. "The Chocolate Soldier" will be played during the week, with the usual Wednesday and Saturday matinees, and judging from its enthusiastic reception last night by the very large audience, ought to be a better popular. Certainly nothing equal to it has been produced in years.

#### At the Princess.

Billie Burke in "Suzanne." A most delightful, frivolous, charming, frothy, dainty, whimsical, entertaining and laughter-making comedy presented at the Princess this week by Miss Billie Burke and a highly capable company. It is adapted from the original of Frantz Fanson and Fernand Wicheler by C. Haddon Chambers, and is altogether concerned with "Suzanne." She is the daughter of an old wholesale beer merchant in Brussels, in whose office the first act is placed. Suzanne works at the book along with Albert Delpeire (Julien L'Estrengue), who has managed to fall in love with her although she is engaged to the son of another beer merchant, Seraphin Meulemeester (Conway Tearle). Her father and mother quarrel a great deal in good comedy style, but with the excellent good-heartedness which is supposed to balance a vast amount of unpleasant manners. Albert adds to the comedy by his Parisian manners, which are not appreciated by the plain-spoken Brussels people.
