

THE WHITE IS DEAD ON FAME AT LADYSMITH

(Can. Press.)—
Sir George White, gov-
ernor of the Cape, and
one of the most distin-
guished soldiers in the
British army, died to-day in his 77th
year.

Sir George White, who was an Irish-
man, having been born in County An-
trim in 1835, passed through a strenu-
ous career as a soldier, fighting Britain's bat-
tles in all parts of the world.

He won the terrible hardships
of the India mutiny in 1857 as a young
officer, taking part in many engage-
ments with the Sepoys. In 1858 he be-
came a captain, and in 1873 a major.

It was during the Afghan war in 1879-
80 that he made his fame and won the
distinction of the Victoria Cross "for
valour."

He accompanied Lord Roberts on his
march to Candahar, and in the final
charge rode straight up to the mus-

zles of the Afghan canon, capturing
one with his own hands, and assured
the British victory.

He afterwards participated in the
Soudanese expedition in 1885 for the
relief of General Gordon and became a
colonel, and in 1886-87 commanded a
brigade in the Burmese war.

He was promoted to the rank of lieu-
tenant-general for distinguished ser-
vices in the field, and thanked by the
government of India. He conducted an
expedition into Zhoob, and from
1894-95 commanded the forces in India.

He was quartermaster-general to the
forces 1888-9, and in 1899-1901, at the
outbreak of the South African war, he
was in command of the army in Natal.

He held Ladysmith against a superior
Boer force from Nov. 2, 1889, to March
1, 1890, 119 days in all, under conditions
which commanded the admiration of
the whole world. After the war he was
appointed governor of the fortress of
Gibraltar.

Montreal Printers Ask More.

MONTREAL, June 24.—(Can. Press.)—Negotiations are in progress between the local typographical unions and the printers and publishers of the city for a revision of the scale of wages which has prevailed for the past five years.

The scale for compositors on day work is now \$16 a week, and an increase to \$20 is asked. An addition to the over-time rate has also been requested, so the net increase is over 25 per cent.

and cranks that actuates an endless chain,
and a new set of documents
is signed and their places under
the pens.

The machines are made in two
models, which differ only in their sizes
and the number of their pens. * * *

Their efficiency evidently depends on
the rapidity of the signer and that of
his assistant. * * * One of the direc-
tors of the Steel Trust has signed his
name 14,000 times in eight hours; two
officers of another trust have been able
to affix both their signatures to 7,000
pounds in five hours, working together.

But the record is held by a New York
financier who signed 6,000 pieces in thirty-eight minutes.

How can man sign his name eight-
een times at once in such a way that
each signature shall be written in ink,
and shall be as incontestably genuine
as if it were the product of the
writer's pen? This problem, says
the Literary Digest, has been solved by
the invention of the "signagraph," which
so greatly abridges the labor of the
official who has to sign cheques, bonds
or other documents by the hundred,
that he can turn them off at a rate of
several thousand an hour.

The machine is an American device,
and Europe, accustomed to hear of
marvellous financial operations in this
country, is regaled with an account of
it by Jacques d'Alar, written in La
Nature. He says:

"The slightest movement of the mon-
itor penholder is repeated simultane-
ously by all the reservoir pens. Thus
the signature that it traces on the tab-
let is transmitted automatically to the
papers or documents arranged under
each of the pens."

"If these papers have been properly
placed, the sixteen or twenty signa-
