

SULLIVAN'S DEATH SUDDEN AND TRAGIC

Old Champion Seized With Heart Failure and Died When About to Take a Bath.

Abington, Mass., Feb. 3.—John Lawrence Sullivan, former heavyweight prize ring champion of the world, the most widely known pugilist that ever lived and probably the most idolized, died at his farm near here today as a result of heart trouble. He was 59 years of age. The former champion had lived on the farm where he died for the last ten years. Three weeks ago he was taken ill with heart trouble, but his health improved, and yesterday he was able to make a trip to Boston. This morning he arose intending to make another trip, but death intervened before he could start on the journey.

Sullivan had had his dramatic side. With him lived George Bush, an old friend, and William Kelley, a 15-year-old boy whom Sullivan had adopted. He was about early after he had stayed up midnight last night absorbed in a new solitaire game. He did his usual morning routine, then came into the house and dressed for his trip to Boston. He was just putting on his finishing touches when he staggered and fell across the bed in a fainting condition.

Bush, who was with him at the time, saw him fall across the bed. Bush ran for water and dashed it over the former champion's face. Under the effect Sullivan revived. He looked surprisedly about him, set on the edge of the bed with his face in his hands. He complained of a pain in his heart and a changed look suddenly spread over his face.

Bush went out of the room and returned with some ice bags which he applied to Sullivan's head, telling him to remain quiet as he had sent for a doctor. "I've listened to a lot of them in my life and I know I'm all right and can doctor myself," said John.

Dr. Rabin, who had been sent for, arrived about this time. He told Sullivan to get undressed and go to bed for a few
