OLD BILL STRONG IN PUBLIC FAVOR

"The Better 'Ole" at Massey Hall Keeps Every Seat Full.

"Bill's" humor and entertaining abilities are shared by his bosom friends, "Air" and "Bert." The play gives a realistic impression of life in the trenches, and shows in a really wonderful way the hardships of a soldier's life in the fields of Belgium and France, as well as the lighter veins in the disposition of our brave boys who went in to win the war for civilization.
