Importers maintain that there was nothing upon which to base the advance made some weeks ago, other than the rise in breadstuffs and firm tone of the pork product market. It is a blessing to the trade that less fodder cheese than usual was made this year, as the existence of any considerable quantity of inferior cheese in export markets would certainly lead to their complete demoralization.
