Manila, May 5 .- (8.25 a.m.) -In spite of the peaceful overtures of their Commission ers, the Filipinos vigorously resisted the advance of General McArthur's division from Apalit toward San Fernandino, fighting esperately at long range, after running desperately at long range, after running from trench to trench when driven out by the American artitlery. The movement commenced at half-past 5 in the morilug. General Hale's brigade, consisting of five Gatilags, under the command of Major Young of the 6th Artillery, two battalloas of the 5thst lowa Regiment, the 1st Nebras-hiegiment and the 1st South Dakota Regi-ment, advanced along the road, a few mires worst of the railway line. 



Manila, May 5 .- (12.25 p.m.)-Detailed re ports of the work of Major-General Lawton's expedition show that harder fighting took place during the early part of this week than earlier accounts indicated. In the attack upon San Rafael, the American forces were met with a heavy fire from a large number of rebels concealed in the jungle on all sides. It was only the adop-tion of the tactics followed in Indian fight-lag in the United States, every man for humself, that saved the division from great loss. General Lawton as usual was at

hinself, that saved the division from great loss. General Lawton, as usual, was at the head of his line with his starf. Scott's battery demolished a stone-fronted trench at short range. The insurgent leaders Gre-gero and Pio Del Pilar, who had 800 men in Balinag, retreated when General Law-ton approached the town. Chief of Scouts Young, with 11 men, entered Balinag ahead of the army, and rang the church bells to announce that they had possession of the city. General Lawton, when at-tacking in force outside of Balinag, saw women and children in the rebel trenches and sent Captain Case in advance, with a white flag to warn the insurgents to re-move the non-combatants. 
