IMPROVEMENTS AT BALMY BEACH

Lawn Tennis Courts, Bowling Green, Club House and Athletic Field Contemplated.

At a meeting of the Balmy Beach Property Owners' Association, held on Wednesday evening, July 3, the question of developing the park was dealt with, and plans will be prepared for this purpose and submitted to the association. It was decided to have three lawn tennis courts, and also to arrange for a bowling green. A space will also be laid out for baseball and other sports. Plans will be prepared for several bathhouses and bathing-benches, also for a clubhouse for the use of the members, which will be ready to date in every respect. Several members have already promised sums of money, and there is no doubt that the necessary amount will be raised.

At present, as the name of the association suggests, property owners only are included in the membership, but a movement is on foot to change the name to the Balmy Beach Association, including in its membership all residents, whether they are property owners or not. This is the plan of the association, and it is hoped that this association has for its object the development of Balmy Beach and vicinity, and has already done much toward this end.

LOST A LOT OF OLD GOLD.

Montreal Assayer Bemoans the Absence of a Valuable Parcel—Will Give \$500 for It.

A. B. Phillips, a Montreal assayer, who is stopping at the Stag Hotel, King and York-streets, is mourning the loss of \$225 worth of old gold. Yesterday afternoon he boarded a Queen's-car about 4:30 at Sunningdale, and rode down town to Adelaide and Yonge-streets. From there he went to Patterson's candy works on Yonge-street, and after leaving the store missed the case containing the gold, which consisted of broken chains, bracelets and watches, the whole weighing about 35 oz. Mr. Phillips, when reporting his loss to the police last night, said that he would give \$50 to the finder of the case and gold.

FOOD AND WEATHER.

Temperature Increased or Reduced by Food.

The old army rations for the tropics has been very sharply criticised for the reason that it consists of articles of food that any person even slightly acquainted with the elements of food knows is not adapted to the needs of the human system in hot weather. Nature shows forth in the selection of food by inhabitants of various countries. For instance, the Eskimoes in a cold climate select heavy, carbonaceous foods, tallow, bacon and such, while the Hindus and inhabitants of hot countries turn to the cereals for sustenance.

We should follow this hint of nature, and particularly in hot weather should avoid much butter, meat or any of that class of food. Perhaps a little meat once a day is not amiss, even in hot weather, but in breakfast and luncheon should be made of fruit, one or two slices of entire wheat bread and some Grape-Nuts and cream. MORGAN CAN AVERT A STRIKE

Unless He Compels Schwab and Smith to Yield, 200,000 Men Will Go Out.

RETURN OF MEN TO BE DEMANDED.

Steel Company to Request Men to Resume Work on Monday—Attitude of Two.

Pittsburg, July 3.—There is ground for the belief that in two weeks the great chain of plants of the United States Steel Corporation, with the exception of the Carnegie Works, will be tied up, and between 200,000 and 250,000 men will voluntarily become idle.

This view would not be taken were it not for the attitude of two men. One is Charles Schwab, president of the United States Steel Corporation. The other is Percival F. Smith, the head of the American Steel and Wire Company. Smith is opposed to labor unions, and has crushed it out in the Carnegie works. Schwab is a labor union man, and is a labor union man, regardless of consequences. If Mr. Morgan cannot compel Schwab to change his views, the strike will extend.

DEMAND RETURN OF MEN.

Pittsburg, July 3.—There were no developments to-day in the strike situation of the steel and hoop works. There was a combined effort seemingly made any attempt to break the solid front of the men at any of the union plants. They still announce that mills not running this week are shut down for repairs. A private telegram from Youngstown, received in this city last night, stated that the American Steel and Wire Company would go direct to the men at its union plants in Girard, Youngstown, Warren, Greenville and Pomfret to-day with the demand that they return to work on Monday at one scale asked by the association. No word of such action has been received to-day at the men's headquarters, however.

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CANADA'S GAME AT THE PAN

Capitals of Ottawa Beat the Torontos by 3 Goals to 2 and Will Play Crescents To-day.

BROOKLYN TEAM WON FROM INDIANS

Canadian Players Injured, but the Caps Have Strong Subs Ready for Final Game.

Buffalo, July 3.—Two games of increase in the Stadium at the Pan-American grounds to-day narrowed down the field in the Canadian-American championship to two teams, the Capitals of Ottawa and the Crescents of Brooklyn. They will meet to-morrow afternoon in the final game. The Crescents defeated the Seneca Indians this morning by a score of 4 to 2. This afternoon the Capitals beat the Torontos, the victory being secured by a goal scored by the Capitals in the second half. The game was particularly close and exciting. The team work of the Canadians was remarkable, and the final game promises to be a good one. Several of the Canadians were injured during today's play, but the Capitals have several substitutes with them, and will be able to put on a strong team for to-morrow. The line-up in this afternoon's game was as follows:
