Hamilton, July 29.—Colin McRae, one of the most prominent business men, died this morning at the age of 81 years. He had lived retired for some years. A few months ago, however, he was in the habit of going to the office of the late Mr. McRae, and his death came rather suddenly today.

LIGHT ON EVANS MYSTERY

During the investigation, a small piece of manila paper was handed to Arnold Smith, Whalley's assistant, who handed it to him in an envelope at the same time and place that the dead man did, and he was asked if that was a part of the envelope he had received his money in that Saturday afternoon. His name which he had received, and he said, after receiving it, he had torn it into two or three pieces and cast it into the floor. Whalley, he said, had taken the envelope at the same time, but he did not see what he did with it.

The detectives did not begin work on this phase of the case until several days after the body was found, yet they had gone thru the scrap paper heap, which was made up of bits from this warehouse, in a remote part of the city, and had found the paper of which the envelope was made. They were looking for the pieces of Whalley's envelope. They did not find it, but they were sure that it was there, and with Whalley when the dead man received his pay.

Everything points to the fact that the detectives have a good deal more information than they have given the jury in their evidence. In fact, Mr. Justice Spencer, virtually admits by his fear of answering questions on this point that there is important information he is apprehensive of making public before the case is ripe.
