

Bill to Aid Establish Plants Six Bylaws To Be Voted On—Mayor Judd to Run for The Town of Clifton, Arizona, Second Term-Mr. Screaton to Retire From the Hospital Trust.

> The electors of London certainly have! their work cut out for them on the 7th of January.

In addition to the ballots for mayor, aldermen, school trustees, hospital trustees and water commissioner, the voters will find themselves confronted with no less than six bylaws upon which to pass judgment.

The bylaws are: 1. The expenditure of \$575,000 by

May Confuse Voters

Some fear is expressed that so many bylaws and so many other ballots will confuse the public and that bylaws which certainly should be carried will be defeated.

If there are no elections by acclamation, there will in addition to the bylaws, be at least 30 names before the electors in January, from which they will be compelled to choose a mayor, twelve aldermen, five school trustees, one hospital trustee, and one water commissioner.
