## A POSTOFFICE

Serving the Rural Districts.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The postoffice department has ordered an innovation in the postal service by the experimental establishment of a "postoffice on wheels," to operate in the vicinity, of Westminster, Md. The service, which is to begin very shortly, calls for the use of a postal wagon to travel over a designated route in rural dis-

Mail boxes can be placed at some point on the route for every farmer living within a mile or two from the proposed route, and mail will be col-lected therefrom.
