## A POSTOFFICE ON WHEELS

Experiment in the United States for Serving the Rural Districts.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The postoffice department has ordered an innovation in the postal service by the experimental establishment of a "postoffice on wheels," to operate in the vicinity of Westminster, Md. The service, which is to begin very shortly, calls for the use of a postal wagon to travel over a designated route in rural districts. Mail boxes can be placed at some point on the route for every farmer living within a mile or two from the proposed route, and mail will be collected therefrom. This is an important feature of the contemplated innovation, which, if successful, will be extended generally, in that it will have money order and registry matter facilities.

## FOX CAUSED HIS DEATH

Benjamin Watkins Receives Fatal Injuries Near Norval.

Brampton, Ont., Nov. 2.—Benjamin Watkins met with an accident Monday afternoon which resulted in his death yesterday. He had driven his car to Acton in the morning to visit his son. When on his way back a hound in pursuit of a fox sprang in front of his horse. The animal turned and ran, throwing Mr. Watkins and his horse. Mr. Watkins was driving with him, on to a stump fence, both were hurt. Mr. Watkins was taken to his son's, 1501 St. John Street, where it was discovered that his injuries, which were internal, were of a serious nature. He became gradually worse until death ended his suffering. The deceased was about 60 years of age, a well-to-do farmer and good citizen.

# HOW THE STRIKE STANDS

Company and Men Still Fail to Agree.

## Another Conference Necessary This Afternoon.

The Arbitration Clause Is a Stickler.

## Company Still Refuse to Recognize the Union.

The Strikers Concede a Clause—Will Not Require New Men To Be Union Men—Financial Aid From Toronto—Tonight May Tell.

What will be the solution of the street car difficulty? From what can be learned up to the hour of going to press there is every likelihood that the company will not make sufficient concession to satisfy the strikers. Last night the points upon which differences existed were telephoned to Mr. Everett at Cleveland, and arrangements made by the company to meet the strikers again this morning at 10 o'clock, when Mr. Everett's reply would be submitted and discussed. The conference continued up to about 1 o'clock, but nothing approaching a solution of the difficulty had been arrived at.

The strikers agreed to modify the clause requiring men entering the services of the company to belong to the union. As the company opposed even the modified form, the disposition of the strikers' committee was to expunge the clause altogether. The company is not disposed to recognize clause 42, which provides for arbitration. The strikers' committee feel that the men will not relinquish this, as they see no injustice in it, and that the clause will be mutually beneficial.

It is these two points that now bar proceedings, and until these are settled, the company decline to discuss the other points in dispute, namely, that of wages, and the reinstatement of certain employees.

Mr. Orr, when asked about the matter this afternoon, said he was not at liberty to talk upon the question, but he indicated that the union would not be recognized. Mr. Orr said another conference would be held at 2:30 this afternoon, and in all probability a climax would be reached by evening, either one way or the other.

From what can be gathered from the men, their general opinion seems to be that the union might as well collapse, and the men go back to work for anything the company might choose to offer them if the arbitration clause were expunged, now that they are willing to expunge clause 2 of their proposal.

## WILL THE CARS RUN?

In case an agreement is not reached between the company and the strikers, the former will proceed to run their cars, and have applied to the chief of police for protection. It is proposed to afford the company all possible protection. The cars will be manned by whom the company choose to run them, and these will be protected by the police, two of whom will be stationed on each car, and more if two are not sufficient to protect the company's property.

In case of a disturbance such as occurred on Friday and Saturday the police will endeavor to disperse the crowd. Three or more men are charged with an unlawful assembly, and twelve or more constitute a mob.

## A MISUNDERSTANDING

Mr. Carr was seen by The Advertiser today, and asked if he regarded the city solicitor's reply to his letter a sufficient guarantee for police protection for the company's cars. "In view of the conference," he replied, "the chief of police has requested me not to run the cars meanwhile, and we do not wish to antagonize any one."

# VERY SEVERE

## Criticism of the United States Position

In Regard to the Philippines and the Debt on the Spanish Island Provinces.

Paris, Nov. 2.—The Soleil today, commenting editorially upon the position assumed by the American peace commissioners, says: "No monarchical government would have dared to conduct itself after the fashion of the Americans who are forever talking so much right and liberty. The plan of the Americans is now evident. It is to take all of Spain's colonies and leave Spain the costs of all those colonies. This is the result of the holy war undertaken to insure the independence of the Cubans. What base hypocrisy do these Liberals, these Democrats, these Republicans show."

St. Petersburg, Nov. 2.—The Novosti, commenting upon the United States' determination to claim the Philippine Islands, says: "The great powers can, like Spain, protest against the proposed cession, as several of them are directly interested in the maintenance of the status quo. In an extreme case the question should be arbitrated."

## FINED \$1,000.

London, Nov. 2.—Martin Rucker, a former promoter of bicycle companies, who was charged with contempt of court in endeavoring to induce Ernest Terah Hooley, the bankrupt company promoter, to alter evidence which reflected upon the Humber Company directors, was fined £200 and costs today, and was further ordered to pay the money today or go to prison. Mr. Hooley declared that Rucker, in behalf of four directors of the Humber Company, offered him £5,000 to change some of the evidence presented in the bankruptcy proceedings.

## STORY OF A SHIPWRECK

Owen Walsh Steward of the Wrecked Barge, the C. P. Minch, of Chicago, in the City.

Owen Walsh, steward on the lumber barge, the C. P. Minch, of Chicago, which was wrecked in Humphrey's Bay, Cove Island, Lake Huron, last Wednesday, was in the city today on his way to his home in Chicago. His perilous adventure has made him happy to be on terra firma once more. All the crew, numbering seven, escaped. The barge had been sought for shelter, during the big storm of last Wednesday, and the wind changed. The two anchors were broken, and the ship carried helplessly before the gale. She grounded about 200 yards from the shore, and after some desperate efforts the men landed. The place was desolate, and after some 24 hours, with nothing to eat, the men managed to make the cove lighthouse in their small boat, which had been washed ashore.

## BIG TAX BUDGET

New York Board of Estimates Allows the City \$96,520,082.

New York, Nov. 2.—The city tax budget amounting to \$96,520,082 was passed by the board of estimates and apportionment. The departmental estimates were cut \$19,020,185. The cut in the estimate of the board of education was \$11,406,584. About \$8,900,000 of this sum was allowed for new schools, but was taken out of the budget on the ground that it should be raised by bonds.
