### NEW HOLD ON THEM

Cincinnati, Sept. 10. - Some amend-.364 ments to the rules governing the com-.340 mission, and one amendment to the in-.336 terpretation of the national agreement were announced today by the national baseball commission. To retain title to contract-jumping players, it will hereafter only be necessary for clubs having such title to carry the players on their reserve lists, the old method of tendering a new contract each March being declared unnecessary. The American Association is requested to abolish its non-reserve contracts, which have given the commission much trouble and are open to suspicion, in many cases, of not being entered into in good faith. The application for reinstatement of Player Reesling, who was declared to have violated his contract with Broklyn, was again denied, and Player Flynn's purchase from Toronto by the Boston Americans was declared to be invalid, the agreemnt not having been in proper form. The Toronto demand that Boston be compelled to complete the deal was denied.


