**MEN IN CATEGORY E
PERMANENTLY UNFIT
IS NEW CAMP ORDER**

Important Change Announced
in Military Regulations.

RELEASED UNTIL CALLED

**Physical Misfits in Army To
Be Struck Off the
Strength.**

Notification of changes in the regula-
tions regarding the categorization of
drafted men was issued at district
headquarters Wednesday. Category E
will hereafter indicate that a man so
rated by the medical authorities is
permanently unfit and may be struck
off the strength of his unit.

Heretofore, category E has been used
to designate those men who are unfit,
but has not been taken to necessarily
mean that such a man was never likely
to be fit again. This is the new
interpretation placed on the term
category E by the military authorities,
and only those who are never likely to
become fit for service as soldiers are
to be raised category E.

To Be Struck Off.
Men who are in future placed in
category E, and who are consequently
not only unfit but permanently unfit,
and, therefore, never likely to become
fit for soldiering in any capacity, are
to be struck off the strength. They
will be released until called, as drafted
men cannot be discharged.

The following are the regulations
published today:

(1) "Draftees who, on examination
by the medical officer of the battalion
to which they report, appear to be in a
category lower than 'A,' will be sent as
soon as possible for re-categorization
before a medical board."
(2) "Those placed by the medical
board in category 'A' will be dealt with
accordingly."
(3) "Those placed by the medical
board in category 'B' will be trans-
ferred to appropriate service companies,
or direct to non-combatant units in the
districts, as the local exigencies of the
service may require."
(4) "Those categorized by the medi-
cal board as 'C' will, if their services
can advantageously be utilized, be
retained on the strength of their unit,
or be transferred to any other unit in
the district; otherwise they will be
granted leave of absence without pay
until men in category 'C' are called, or
until they are ordered to report for re-
examination."

Will Be Retained.
(5) "Men who are found to be
temporarily unfit by reason of dis-
abilities which can be remedied by ap-
propriate treatment, and who, in the
opinion of the medical board, are
likely to be fit for general service
within a reasonable period, will be re-
tained on the strength of their unit for
treatment; otherwise, they will be
granted leave of absence without pay
until men in category 'D' are ordered
to report for re-examination."

"Notes: Physical defects such as in-
civil practice can be remedied by
surgical treatment (e. g. hernia and
varicose) will cause the man to be
placed in the appropriate category and
dealt with accordingly. Surgical treat-
ment will not be ordered."
(6) "Men categorized as 'E' will be
immediately struck off the strength, in
which case, proceedings of medical
board, will be dealt with as provided
for."

(7) "Draftees subsequently lowered
in category after having been cate-
gorized by the medical board will be
treated in accordance with the forego-
ing instructions."

(8) "Draftees who are granted leave
of absence without pay, or are struck
off the strength on account of medical
unfitness in accordance with the fore-
going instructions, will be granted
transportation back to the point from
which they came to report for duty."

**SAY SOME FIRMS
CHARGE \$12 FOR
ONE TON OF COAL**

Trades and Labor Men Want
an Investigation
Made.

Discrimination in the handling of
coal by city dealers, selling short meas-
ure wood, persecution of Sergt. Varley,
and the city fish market, were some of
the questions discussed by the delegates
at the trades and labor council's meet-
ing last night. It was alleged by some
delegates that coal dealers have been
charging as high as \$12 per ton for
coal, and refusing to deliver it at that
price, making the consumer pay deliv-
ery charges, which run as high as \$2
per ton in quarter-ton lots.

One delegate stated that he stopped
two men going home one night with
a bag of coal each and asked them
what they had paid for the fuel. One
stated he had paid \$1, while the other
admitted paying \$1.50 for a 100-pound
bag.

This was answered by another dele-
gate making the statement that W.
Martin promised that his company
would take to task any of their dealers
who showed discrimination in any way
in the handling of coal, if bonafide
cases were presented.

The names of the men were not
known, and no action was taken.
In regard to the question of short
measure wood being sold, Delegate
Hessal informed the meeting that he
had discovered that there was a bylaw
on the city books which covered this.

Quoted Bylaw.
"This bylaw states," he said, "that
no person is allowed to sell wood in the
city without a certificate from the
market clerk, certifying the amount of
wood the load contains."

Further, he asserted the meeting that
any citizen, if he thought his wood was
short, he had the privilege of hiring
some one to pile "x" wood in the
presence of a policeman, and measure
it at the vendor's expense.

The bylaw, being an old one, allows
only 10 cents for this labor, one dele-
gate pointed out that it was decided
to send a communication to the coun-
cil asking that the remuneration be
made conform with the present high
scale of wages.

Some of the delegates, speaking of
the municipal sale of fish, stated that
the present council intended taking no
step to secure a further supply after
that on hand is sold. A resolution was
passed that a letter be sent from the
trades and labor council and also from
all local unions represented, to the city
council, urging that body to use every
effort to continue the municipal sale
of fish, and also to use every effort to
establish a municipal wood yard.

Sergt. Varley's Case.
Sergt. Varley's case came up for a
deal of discussion by the delegates pres-
ent. It was the general opinion that the
sergeant was being persecuted for the
part he had taken in the last Dominion
election.

Urged Co-operation.
A delegation was received from the
Independent Labor party, Henry B.
Ashman and Miss Knight, speaking.
They urged co-operation between
the two bodies to further the interest
of the working class. To this end they
asked that a committee be appointed
by the trades and labor council to
meet with a committee of the Inde-
pendent Labor party to formulate some
plan, whereby labor would have a more
powerful hand in the political world.

It was decided that the election com-
mittee of the trades and labor coun-
cil should act.

E. Odell, organizer of shoe workers,
Hamilton; H. A. Sullivan, organizer of
cigar-makers, Hamilton, and W. J.
Hevey of the Industrial Banner, To-
ronto, gave short addresses.

The delegates present reported con-
ditions fair to good in the several
trades.
