In the course of his remarks, Mr. Wright mentioned some of the items of expenditure in hotel-keeping. such as \$24,000 annually for fresh meats, \$900 monthly for butter and eggs, and a pay roll of \$60.000 a year.

To newspaper advertising he attributes the fact that 1915 was a better year for the Walker House than the former record year 1913. His adver-tisements appeared in no less than

270 western newspapers in the fall of 1915, and as a result the Walker House and Carls-Rite were both filled to capacity during the Christmas season as were also most of the other city hotels to which he sent guests whom his own houses could not accommo
