BRITAIN IS TERMED AUSTRIA'S CHIEF FOE

Baron Von Plener Says Austria Desires an Honorable Peace.

Munich, July 1.—Despatches from Vienna quote the former Polish minister Blinsky as saying during the course of the budget debate that the new kingdom of Poland must incorporate a monarchy under the sceptre of a Kaiser and form with Galicia an independent kingdom as in the case of Austria-Hungary.

Baron Von Plener, the official reporter of the debate, said that this solution of the Polish question was the right one, adding: "As things stand today the English are actually Austria's chief foes. There is no other country where Austrian subjects after the war will be so maltreated and oppressed as in England. It is only due to special friendships on our side that we make no reprisals. Every intelligent person perceives that we desire peace, not from weakness, but from an honorable peace policy."

CONFIDENCE FELT IN ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

Premier Boselli is Elated Over Decisive Vote on Resolution.

Rome, Saturday, June 30.—(Delayed)—The secret session of the chamber of deputies closed today with a vote of confidence in the government. There were 361 votes in favor of the resolution of confidence and 61 against.

Mexico City, July 1.—Beginning today the exportation from Mexico of corn, wheat, rice, black beans and flour is prohibited. The exportation of peas, onions, Spanish beans, lima beans, lentils, bran and sugar will be allowed after today only on special permit from the treasury department.

SOCIALISTS IN BOSTON ARE HIGHLY UNPOPULAR

Peace Parade is Broken Up and Socialist Headquarters Attacked.

Boston, July 2.—A survey today of the districts covered by rioting yesterday, when uniformed soldiers and sailors broke up a socialist peace parade, showed that the actual damage done, aside from torn banners and clothing, was confined to the socialist party headquarters in Park Square. Large quantities of literature and pictures were hauled from the rooms to the street and burned, and the furniture was roughly handled.

Lieut.-Col. Le Grand Reed Takes Charge of Recruiting. Boston, July 2.—The "Kilties" members of the 28th New Brunswick Regiment who have been conducting a successful recruiting campaign here among British subjects, departed last night and today.

AUSTRIANS ASSAIL TRENTOINO SECTOR

Italians Beat Off Foe Assaults in Lake Garda Region.

Rome, July 2.—Austrian troops last night made unsuccessful assaults against the Italian positions between Lake Garda and the Ledro Valley, in the southwestern Trentino, according to the official statement issued by the war office today.

Armed Band Destroys Small Enemy Post Near Panaret. Rome, July 2.—A well-armed band of one of our armed Albanian bands on June 30 destroyed a small enemy post near Panaret, on the upper Osum River. Some Austrian regulars were captured and the attack caused great alarm within the enemy lines.

VENICE IS BOMBARDED BY ENEMY AEROPLANES

Italians, in Reprisal, Raid Trieste—Foe Bombs Do No Damage.

Rome, July 2.—Venice has again been attacked by Austrian airplanes, the war office announces. The Italians raided Trieste in reprisal. The statement follows: "A group of enemy airplanes raided Venice, Murano and Chioggia (the last two are towns near Venice) on Friday night. Bombs were thrown on houses. There were no victims. Anti-aircraft batteries bombarded the airplanes vigorously, and there is reason to believe two raiders were hit."

AMSTERDAM RIOT DUE TO DEARTH OF POTATOES Mounted Policemen Are Injured by Stones Thrown by Crowd. Amsterdam, July 2.—The Handelsblad prints a report of disturbances over the supply of potatoes in Amsterdam. Hundreds of women and youths collected in the Cruisweg, where a few potatoes had arrived. Only a small portion of the crowd could be supplied.

GERMAN CONCEAL LOSSES ON U-BOATS

Hun Newspapers Refrain From Publishing Death Notices.

Copenhagen, July 2.—For many weeks, obviously in compliance with orders of the censor, German newspapers have published no death notices from the submarine service, from which conclusions regarding the number of submarines destroyed might be drawn. The monthly obituary tribute of the Hamburg-American Co. to fallen employes appears, however, to the navy. Nearly all are from the mechanical personnel of the command, and it is a fair presumption that they were lost in the submarine campaign, because trained mechanics are not assigned to the marine forces in Flotilla, and surface ships are little exposed to casualties.
