

Russians in their great offensive just begun against the Austrians on the 275 miles of front between the Pripet marshes and the Roumanian border. This engagament is not a partial one, but a general attack along the whole line, and Petrograd reports that the Russians everywhere carried the first chain of Austrian defences. The Austrians are said to have 40 infantry and 10 to 15 cavalry divisions stationed on this front, or about 600,000 men. This gives them a concentration of a little over 2000 men a mile, or hardly enough to hold so extended a front. The sudden appearance of big Russian forces, concentrated in Bessarabia, beyond the observation of spies and aeroplanes, is said to have taken the enemy completely by surprise. The bulk of the Austrian and German forces are concentrated in France, the Italian war zone or the Balkans. The enemy, in this battle, has yielded territory before the Russian attacks without even endeavoring to counter-attack, a new thing in this war.

Brusiloff, the Russian commander, is imbued with the true offensive spirit. He is noted for quick decision and rapid action. His plan was adopted by General Ruszky at the battle of Lemberg at the beginning of the war and it won for the Russians a brilliant victory. He is pushing his men forward in this new offensive with great audacity. It is probable that Earl Kitchener was on his way to Russia to see the development of this grand advance. It is too early yet to attempt a forecast of what the Russians will do, but the effects on the general situation of the war can be imagined if the Russians break the Austrian front and send a big force of Cossacks on a raid into Hungary. A great outcry would be raised to Germany for assistance, and the German general staff could not disregard the call. Troops might be hastily sent from France and the Italian front and an opening given for the allies to begin the offensive war against

The capture of 25,000 Austrians probably represents the infliction of 100,000 to 150,000 casualties on the enemy by the Russians. Three or four more days of such a pounding and the Teuton army will be in grave danger of being destroyed. In the meanwhile the pounding which is being given the see is likely to attract all available hostile reinforcements to the theatre of the offensive. If the enemy starts to withdraw big forces from France then the time will come for the allies to strike him all along the line. The Russians already claim that the initiative belongs entirely to Defender of Fortification Bethem in Galicia and Bessarabia. Startling developments may therefore be looked for in the next few weeks, either in the east or the west, or, perhaps, in both theatres. The Italians with great energy still continue to hold their front un-broken against the rain of heavy blows hammered on their lines by the Austrians in the mountains of the Trentino. Altho a heavy snow storm is raging the fighting goes on without intermission. A dozen heavy Austrian attacks were repulsed during one night and day, according to yesterday's official communique issued at Rome.

Only a heavy artillery action was fought all yesterday in the region of Fort Vaux and Damloup Village, north of Verdun.
