AWFUL FATE OF TWO CHILDREN Burned to Death in a Kitchen While Their Mother was Away.

(Montreal Herald, Friday). Locked in the kitchen because they would be "safe" if allowed (aged two years), and Annette (aged four), Dupuis, the children of Mr. and Mrs. Philippe Dupuis, of 201 Champlain street, were shortly before ten o'clock this morning, as a result of a fire in the kitchen, burned to death in a kitchen while their mother was away.

The mother of the children left them in the kitchen while she went for some groceries from the store, and to make sure they would not get out and wander away, left the children locked in.

Shortly afterwards, Mrs. Joseph Leveille, living next door, heard the fearful shrieks of children in terror proceeding from Mrs. Dupuis' kitchen. She rushed in alarm, to seek the cause, and found the door of the room locked, and the children screaming behind it.

Mrs. Leveille promptly smashed the glass panes, but her arm throbbed and got the door open, and in doing this she had her arm so badly cut that it had to be sewn up by Dr. Devore.

Distressing the kitchen she found both children practically on fire, and this brave woman then extinguished the flames by wrapping around them an old blanket she had scratched from behind the door.

The little girl, it appears, had herself endeavored to put out the burning clothes of her younger brother, and in this way had got her own clothes set on fire. The little boy had caused the entire fire by scratching matches on the framework of the window, and this fatal accident had happened in the few minutes. When Mrs. Dupuis returned she collapsed, and after the ambulance had been summoned by Constable Perrier, of No. 3 station, who had been called to the house, and the poor children taken off to Notre Dame Hospital, Mrs. Dupuis was nearly beside herself with grief and despair.

Father Lussier, from Maisonneuve Catholic church, was called in to attempt to comfort her, in which he was assisted by Ald. Leveille, who, passing by at the time, heard of the terrible accident and went in to render, if possible, any assistance.

Albert died on the way to the hospital, and after lingering in agony relieved of course, as far as possible by the ministrations of the physicians at the hospital, little Annette Dupuis died shortly after midday.
