WAR HITS HARVARD HARD

Registration figures at Harvard university disclose that every department except the medical has lost from 14 per cent. to 78 per cent. of its students because of the war. The medical department, with 374 men enrolled shows a gain of 30 students over last year.

With the total enrollment of 4,671 for the entire university, Harvard begins its 292nd year with a loss of 1,804 men. The total registration of 1,581 for the college shows a loss of 880 students.

The law school is the hardest hit, 284 students enrolling against 788 last year.

This year's freshman class has 335 men as compared with 680 last year.

Enrollment for the junior class is nearly normal, but the registration for the senior class is 189 against 288 for last year.

Princeton university Tuesday began its 171st year with its enrollment diminished to between 800 and 900, through the enlistment of 600 students and 40 faculty members, who are in active service or engaged in special war work.

Brown University has opened its 150th year Wednesday morning with an entering class of probably over 300, but with its upper classes greatly depleted by enlistments. There is a loss of about 80 per cent. compared with last year's enrollment.
