Charles H. Knodell.

Many expressions of regret were heard today when it became known that Charles H. Knodell had passed away. In hope that an operation would restore him to vigorous health, after a period in which he had not been very well, he entered the General Public Hospital a little less than two weeks ago and an operation was performed. Hopes, however, were not to be realized and for the last few days his family have been very anxious. He died at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Knodell was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George A. Knodell. He was for a time associated with his father in the latter's printing business and then took up the work of commercial traveler. He has been the representative of Dearborn and Co., and other houses and for some time was in the wholesale fruit business in Water street. For the last 10 years or so he had represented the F. S. Bower Co. in New Brunswick with marked success.

As he had occasion to visit many parts of the Maritimes in the course of his business career he attained a wide acquaintance with the places and people and his genial manner had won him friends everywhere. He had a good grasp of affairs, was a student of the large questions of the day and always commanded attention with his views on matters under discussion. He was of optimistic nature, with a wholehearted faith in his city and country and was never deterred from supporting their claims. He made friends readily and held their regard by his staunch qualities. In his younger days Mr. Knodell was active in sporting matters and he always retained his interest in the upbuilding of the youth in good sport. The South End Baseball League had no more consistent follower than he. He was keenly interested in the political fortunes of the country and was particularly well informed in the matters affecting the Maritimes. He was a staunch Liberal and was usually found in the forefront of battle at election times.

Mr. Knodell is survived by his wife, who was Miss Florrie McConnell, and by one brother, J. William, and two sisters, Mrs. F. R. Dearborn, Miss M. Elizabeth Knodell and Miss Jennie C. Knodell. The deep sympathy of a large number of friends will go out to them in their bereavement.

Alfred Leonard.

Friends will sympathize deeply with the family of Alfred Leonard, son of the late William and Margaret Leonard, whose death occurred Saturday noon at his home, 125 Elliot Row, after a lingering illness which he endured with great patience and much suffering. The late Mr. Leonard, who was 74 years of age, was a life-long resident of this city, being employed in the C. N. R. for 30 years. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Harry F. of Windsor, Ont., and Frederick L. of this city, and one daughter, Martha M. of Montreal, Que. The funeral will be held from his late residence, 95 Rothney avenue, Tuesday afternoon, October 21, and the service will be at 2 o'clock.

Miss Elma Short.

Many friends in St. John will be greatly shocked to learn of the death of Miss Elma Short which occurred suddenly at her home in New Brunswick, Queens county, after an illness of only one day. Miss Short who carried on her work in St. John had come to her home for a vacation and was expected to return to the city in a fortnight. She was apparently in good health and it is thought that her death was due to heart failure. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Short, of New Brunswick.




