U. S. Yachts Win.
Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 17.—The team

Prison Reform.

The cardinal question that is now being
discussed is whether it is possible to

combine reformatory and punitive ele-
ments at all in a system of prison treat-
ment without all that is reformatory or
curative being neutralized by the puni-
tive elements. The difficulties of answer-
ing such a question decisively are obvious,
and it may be regarded as certain that
though early changes in the general
treatment of criminals are probable,
they will, in conservative Britain at all
events, be conceived in a spirit of caution.
And the same remark doubtless applies
to the Union of South Africa.
