### DOG'S AND OWNERS FIGHT.

Undertaker Arrested on Charge of Stabbing the Other Man.

St. Paul, March 23.—Tom Gibbons, who built up a score of knockouts in his quest of the heavyweight pugilistic championship, only to be outpointed a few days ago by Harry Greb of Pittsburg, cannot punch any harder than he ever could, and has been ruined as a superb boxer, temporarily at least. So says his brother, according to news despatches from Grand Forks, N. D.

"I feel sorry for Tom," Mike said, "but it was his own fault. Tom has fallen into the same rut that has been the downfall of many other great boxers. He thought he could hit, and he knocked out a couple of dozen of big, slow fellows, which got him quite a standing in the pugilistic world, but it has ruined him as a boxer."

"Tom now neglects to apply himself properly. When training to fight a fellow of the Greb type he should be trained for speed with fast boxers. Instead of that, he worked out with big 'hams,' and was always practicing knockout punches. The result was he was too slow."

"Tom also placed a lot of confidence in a secret punch, a left hook to the liver. This punch is no secret; in fact, it is older than Tom himself. Every one knew Tom was trying to use it. Dal Hawkins first made this left-hook-to-the-body punch famous twenty years ago. Nelson was not a good boxer, and was forced to resort to his punching ability. The fact is Tom cannot hit any harder now than he ever could."

### AQUATIC.

An Apt Pupil.

New Brunswick, N. J., March 23.—Unable to swim and a champion plunger, all within one month, is the remarkable achievement of Eugene Von Stanley, a Rutgers freshman, who recently won the Eastern Intercollegiate Swimming Association plunging title in the Lehigh pool. Coach Jim Kelly took Von Stanley under his wing in February. First he had to teach the Trenton youngster how to swim, then how to dive, how to hold his breath and finally all the plunging technique of a deep take-off, gradual ascent to the surface and then how to float straight.

Von Stanley proved an apt pupil and a month later won the title.

### DOG'S AND OWNERS FIGHT.

Undertaker Arrested on Charge of Stabbing the Other Man.

William A. Skahill, an undertaker, of 368 West Fifth street, New York, who was prosecuted by the government some time ago on a charge of improper burial methods, it being alleged that he buried three soldiers in one grave, was arrested by detectives from the West Forty-seventh street police station on a charge of felonious assault, brought by James A. Lynch of 322 West Forty-seventh street, brother of Joe Lynch, a pugilist.

Skahill was walking down Eighth avenue last night, leading a Boston bulldog, when he encountered Lynch, who was leading a large building. The dogs got into a fight, and when they were separated Skahill berated Lynch for letting his large dog "pick on" the small one.

Lynch resented the remarks, and soon the two opened the dogs were in a rough-and-tumble fight. Onlookers separated them, and Lynch was taken to the Roosevelt Hospital, where it was found he had a stab wound in the left side.

After having his wound dressed, Lynch went to the police station and told his story. Detectives then went to Skahill's undertaking establishment and arrested him. He admitted having had a fight with Lynch, but denied doing any stabbing.

### YOUNG GIRL GIVES EVIDENCE AGAINST RICKARD AT TRIAL

New York, March 23.—Resuming her testimony today before a supreme court jury trying Tex Rickard for attacking her, fifteen-year-old Sarah Schoenfeld declared that three days after his arrest the sports promoter took her and Nellie Gasko, a school girl chum, for an automobile ride through Central Park and told them to say "another man did it" if they got caught. Rickard was under arrest at the time for attacking Alice Ruck, fifteen.
