### WILL SPEAK HERE.

The announcement that Frederic Hudd, Canadian trade commissioner in New York, will address the Canadian Club next week gives great satisfaction. Mr. Hudd will also attend the annual convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in St. Andrews next week. The subject of his address in St. John will be The Lady Next Door.

### PYTHIAN SISTERS.

The fortnightly meeting of Moulton Temple No. 14, Pythian Sisters, was held last night at the Pythian Castle, Union street, with Annie Waters, M.E.C., in the chair. The regular routine of business was gone through with and plans were made for the early fall. There will be one more meeting of Moulton Temple before closing for the summer months.

### EXAMINATIONS BEGUN.

School teachers' license examinations are being held today and will continue until Friday in the assembly hall of the Central school, on St. Vincent's street. The examiners are Inspector S. A. Worrell and L. A. Gilbert. There are thirty-nine candidates taking the examinations in the city in the following classes: Grammar school, fifteen; superior, one; first class, eight; second class, five.

### NEVINS WILL.

The case of the contested will of Charles Nevins is nearing a close with the argument of one lawyer yet to be heard. Before Judge McInerney this morning, J. F. H. Teed, who appears for Miss Susie Smith, beneficiary under the will, concluded his argument and this afternoon Daniel Mullin, K. C., who appears for the contestants, will argue. It is expected that the argument will be finished this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

### FOR PETEWAU CAMP.

Corporal Thompson, R.C.A., of Petewau, arrived in the city yesterday and last evening commenced instruction of members of the 3rd N. B. Regiment, C.G.A., in preparation for their annual camp. The 6th Siege Battery will leave for Petewau on July 7, the 10th Heavy Battery on July 9 and the 4th Siege Battery on July 14. About fifty all ranks will attend from each battery and each unit will remain at the training grounds for six days.

### RIFLE LEAGUE SHOOT.

The second Canadian Rifle League shoot will be held this afternoon on the rifle range by the St. John's Rifle Association. Three spoons will be given in connection with this shoot, one to the highest score in each of the three classes at ranges of 200, 300 and 400 yards under field conditions. Notice has been issued that an issue of 900 rounds of .303 calibre rifle ammunition will be made to military and civilian clubs and to cadet corps. Notice of an issue of 22 calibre ammunition was given recently.

### ARE SUSPENDED.

L. T. Dow, secretary of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. this morning issued an official bulletin that nine players of the East End Improvement League Baseball club have been suspended indefinitely for playing with an unregistered club, and that all amateurs are warned under penalty of suspension not to compete with or against them. The men are H. Thompson, A. Latham, J. Corrigan, J. Gillespie, I. Davis, T. Burke, R. Bartlett, J. Tanaman and Thomas Campbell. This is an outcome of the Wolves game with St. George.

### SOLDIER BOWLERS.

The Royal Canadian Army Service Corps bowling team retains the permanent force challenge cup again this year by winning a three-cornered game last night on the armory alleys with the teams from headquarters and R. C. O. C. No. 2. The R. C. A. S. C. team consists of Captain Winter, Sweet, DeVenne, Garnett and Alderman. They made a total of 1,185 against scores of 1,171 by the headquarters team and 1,163 by the R. C. O. C. This is the closing match in the Garrison league for the year, and marks the end of a very successful season.

### HEARTILY WELCOMED.

Miss Mabel Finn of Edmonton, formerly of this city, who has been studying social service at Columbia University, New York, is the guest of Mrs. D. C. Dearden, Douglas avenue. She will return to the west about the end of the week to take up work in connection with the Civic Welfare Department at Edmonton. Miss Finn was for several years during the war with Miss Mary Plummer on the staff of the Canadian Field Comforts Commission, which supplied soldiers with many luxuries from cigarettes to complete baseball outfits, with money contributed by the Canadian people. She is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael A. Finn and is being warmly greeted by St. John friends.

### MILITARY MATTERS.

The work of making over the armory for the accommodation of the headquarters staff has been commenced and it is hoped to move into the new quarters some time in July. The lease on the present building will expire about August 1, and it was decided to move to the armory some time ago in accordance with the general cutting down of military expenses.  
A meeting of the Garrison Sports and Entertainment Association will be held tomorrow night following the Garrison league baseball game.  
Sub-Conductor W. O. Sula, of the R. C. O. C., has been detailed to this military district to take the place of Major T. Pugh as senior ordnance officer of the district.

## QUISPAMIS IS KEEN FOR HYDRO

Community Club arranges for a Committee to Consider Joining Fair Vale and Gondola Point in Electric Light District.

The newly formed Community Club of Quispamsis, of which James Thompson is president and F. C. Morrison is secretary, met last night in the church hall near Quispamsis station, to consider the matter of hydro distribution in the community.

Business assembling in regular session, the club gave an attentive hearing to members of the Fair Vale and Gondola Point committee in the formation of an electric light district. This district, when organized, it was thought desirable, could make a contract and arrangements to construct a pole line to connect with the Moncton transmission line about a mile above Robesay.

Quispamsis was invited to name a committee which, with the Fair Vale and Gondola Point committee, would wait upon the electric power commission and obtain such information as was necessary and report back to their respective communities.  
Mr. Foss explained what current would be available for the residents, provided there was a sufficient number of them to warrant the expense of a step-down transformer and to insure interest upon the expenditure. The matter for raising money for the necessary construction would have to be thought out and agreed upon and further legislation introduced to legalize any steps that might be taken towards the formation of an electric light district. He answered the pertinent questions regarding the cost of construction and everybody appeared to be much interested in the proposition.

Harry Magee was named chairman of a committee with power to select members to meet with the committee from the Fair Vale-Gondola Point section.

## WE'RE LIKELY TO SEE WARSHIP OR SQUADRON

There is some probability that a squadron of the British fleet, under Admiral William Pakenham, which is making a tour of maritime ports, will visit St. John at some time during the summer. While the admiral has not yet replied to the invitation which was sent to him by R. E. Armstrong, president of the New Brunswick division of the Navy League, Mr. Armstrong has received a reply from Hon. George P. Graham, minister of marine, which whom he also communicated. Hon. Mr. Graham wrote that while the movements and visits of the fleet were under the direction of the admiral of the squadron, he felt sure that the latter would be only too glad to comply with the wish of the Navy League and come to St. John at some time during the maritime tour. If it was impossible for the squadron to come, probably one ship could make the visit. He said also that he was communicating with the admiral on the subject.

### PARK AUTO CASE.

Allison Cushing was before the sitting magistrate this morning on a charge of driving his automobile through Rockwood Park on paths not open to traffic. Mr. Cushing said there was no disposition on his part to break the law, but he was not aware that the road was not open to automobiles, and he had seen the tracks of cars which had passed over the paths. Hon. R. E. Armstrong, president of the St. John Horticultural Association, was present on behalf of the association and said that the association had no wish to take people's money, but were looking to the best interests of the park, where much time and money had been spent. He said there were two reasons why automobiles were not wanted there: one was that they damaged the roads and the other was that there were no sidewalks and therefore no provision for pedestrians when cars came along the road. A fine of \$8 was imposed and allowed to stand.

### TRAFFIC CASE.

A case against James Marr, charged with making a wrong turn at the corner of Mill and Main street, striking and doing damage to street car No. 84, was taken up this morning. Mr. Marr said he had not been driving the car at the time; that it was driven by Merl Knodell. Mr. Knodell said he did not go to the corner just behind another car, which stopped suddenly. He had not had time to stop and could not get straight ahead, as there were passengers alighting from a street car, so he had no recourse but to attempt to drive across in front of the car. He struck the fender of the car and bent it. Policeman Gaudet told of the occurrence, but said he did not see the other car. Motorman Wood, driver of the street car, said he did not think it necessary to have driven in front of the car. Mr. Marr said Knodell had driven for him for some time and he had always found him a very capable and careful driver. This was the first time he had been in court. A fine of \$10 was imposed.

Garson, Douglas avenue, last evening, in a farewell surprise party in honor of Misses Sarah and Helen Levine, Mrs. Garson's sisters. A very happy evening was spent, marked by two presentations as special features. At these Hymie Marcus and Eli Boyaner officiated, presenting a beautiful travelling Club Bag to each of the young ladies. Each replied nicely an acknowledgment. Solos were sung by Miss Sarah and Helen Levine. Baile dancing and games were enjoyed and a dainty luncheon was served by the hostess, Mrs. Garson. Mrs. J. Levine and Miss Gordon. Misses Levine have made many friends here and will be much missed.
