Mrs. Ralph Smith, M.P.P. of Vancouver, first woman member of parliament in Canada, was the speaker at the morning service in Ludlow street Baptist church yesterday. Rev. W. R. Robinson, the pastor, in introducing Mrs. Smith, paid a very high tribute to the National Council of Women and expressed his pleasure that Ludlow street church was the first church in the province to welcome the first woman member of parliament. Mrs. Smith took as the basis of her address the 28rd Psalm. She was listened to with rapt attention by a large congregation. The pastor of the church delivered a very forceful address on the referendum at the evening service and made a strong appeal for all to support the present prohibitory law. 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


