Eight young ladies assisted at the tables. They were Misses Joan Foster, Kathleen and Emily Sturges, Leslie Skinner, Marc Armstrong, Mary White, Barbara and Isabel Jack.

FROM BATHURST ON VISIT.
Harold Ramsey and his brother-in-law, Joseph E. Ryan, who is the former a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Ramsey, Moore street, arrived in the city on Saturday evening on a short visit, accompanied by automobile. They will leave for home tomorrow morning and will be accompanied by Mrs. Ryan, who has been visiting her parents. Mr. Ramsey is a law partner of Hon. J. P. Byrne, attorney-general.

OFFICERS ELECTED.
The men's Brotherhood class of Ludlow street Baptist Sunday school held their annual meeting on Sunday afternoon and elected the following officers: Teachers, the pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson; president, George T. Ring; 1st vice-president, Geo. Belys; 2nd vice-president, James McLean; secretary, Louise J. Hanson; treasurer, Miss M. E. Crawford; executive committee, W. H. Crawford, John White, W. M. Fulton and Amos Horton, superintendent of Sunday school. The class is planning a membership campaign and other work.

CIRCUS AND GROUNDS
In conversation with a Times reporter today Armstrong & Bruce said that there was a woman member of the circus last year. She maintained that the circus had secured a lease of Shamrock grounds, but on finding it too wet had put their tents upon their property without permission and that they were unable that day to get an injunction out against them. This year they said they were spoken to by representatives of two circuses and that they had refused to lease the grounds to small one, which could be handled on the property without detriment to the householders.

LUDLOW STREET CHURCH
Mrs. Ralph Smith, M. P. P. of Vancouver, first woman member of parliament in Canada, was the speaker at the morning service in Ludlow street Baptist church yesterday. Rev. W. R. Robinson, the pastor, in introducing Mrs. Smith, paid a very high tribute to the National Council of Women and expressed his pleasure that Ludlow street church was the first church in the province to welcome the first woman member of parliament. Mrs. Smith took as the basis of her address the 23rd Psalm. She was listened to with rapt attention by a large congregation. The pastor of the church delivered a very forceful address on the referendum at the evening service and made a strong appeal for all to support the present prohibitory law. He said that to go back to license would put the province back one hundred years. The comrades choir led the singing at both services. In the morning, E. Clyde Parsons sang "The King of Love," and in the evening Ralph J. Rupert sang "The Prodigal." Both solos were especially well sung.

PROPERTY SALES.

Wilber to Catherine E. de Grasse; two-family house large city household lot on the Manawagonish road, Fairville, sold for Charlotte A. Sweet to Joseph H. Galey; self-contained house, Alexander street, sold for W. J. McAlary to Robert Thornton.

MONEY SOON OR STAFF MUST WALK STREETS

Commissioner Frink on Public Works Finances

Statement to Delegation re Paving — Four German Guns to Be Sent Here as War Trophies — Business at City Hall.

A meeting of the committee of the council was held this morning. During a reply to a delegation representing the Canadian Building and Construction Association, local branch, Commissioner Frink said that his department would need financial help by the end of August or otherwise he would have to allow his staff to walk the streets, as there would be no money to pay them. A delegation from the Canadian Building and Construction Institute was heard, J. A. Grant, president of the local branch, said that they had held a meeting and decided that J. T. Kane, one of the members had not been fairly dealt with regarding paying Prince William street. He spoke of the long line of claims since the tender was submitted, on February 23 until Mr. Kane's check was returned early in June. He said that Mr. Kane had sacrificed other work because he had been led to believe he would be given the contract. Mr. Kane said that he had lost time and money by the delay, he had sacrificed other work and had not been dealt with fairly.

Commissioner Frink gave details about the receipt of the tenders and quoted the prices submitted by the contractors. He told of a communication from Mr. Kane and also a conversation he had with him in which he said he would require twenty-five per cent more if he was to go on with his contract owing to an increase in concrete, and other material. Mr. Frink said that the road engineer submitted a report showing that the city could lay the pavement cheaper than the lowest tender as they had the material on hand. He spoke about the financial condition of his department and said that unless he received money from the council by the end of August the staff would have to go out and it would not only be a matter of the pick and shovel, but also the office staff.

The delegation said that they brought up the matter only in the spirit of fair play and after thanking the council they withdrew. The delegation consisted of President, J. A. Grant, W. J. Crawford, representing the plumbers, and Mr. Kane. Commissioner Frink brought up a request from the New Brunswick Telephone Company for permission to lay a conduit in City road from Wall street to Ritchie street. He said he would not favor granting the permission as a contractor was now laying a new pavement. He said they had ample opportunity to ask for this permission before the contractor started paving and he was opposed to them starting to tear up the street again. He moved that the request be not complied with. This was seconded by Commissioner Thornton, and after a discussion was passed. Commissioner Thornton said they should have a report of the gas pipes in Prince William street.

Commissioner Frink read a letter from John Alexander saying that he had been in poor health for some time and in the advice of his physician was asking for six weeks vacation. He said he had been in the service for twenty years. He was granted full pay for his regular holidays and half pay for the remaining weeks.

Street Railway.
Thomas H. McCauley, manager of the N. B. Power Company, addressed the meeting regarding his application for a turn out at the corner of Charlotte street and the north side of King square. After a report had been read from Road Engineer Hatfield, Commissioner Frink moved that permission be granted under plans and specifications submitted by the road engineer. This was carried.

Commissioner Bullock submitted a report regarding the purchasing and repair of the trolley cars. He said the purchase price would be \$18,000; that the contract for repairs to be done by the Union Foundry would be \$7,100; that work to the hull would be done by J. S. Gregory for \$2,500; that stripping would cost \$86 and rental of the trucks would be \$25 making a total of \$24,830. The estimated cost of the work was \$20,000, \$2,500 of which was to be done by the city and \$2,500 by the county.

Commissioner Frink moved that he be given permission to purchase 1,200 barrels of concrete for Prince William street paving work. Permission was granted.

German Guns.
A communication was read from the War Trophies committee, saying that they were awaiting the city four German field guns. On motion the communication was received with thanks. A discussion regarding allotment of these guns took place, but no definite action was taken.

A communication was read from the Women's Hospital Aid notifying the council that they had nominated Mrs. R. Duncan Smith as a candidate for the vacancy on the hospital commission.

Commissioner Thornton spoke about a protest sent in by residents of the North End regarding allowing a circus to show on the property of Armstrong & Bruce. He said he had learned that a contract had been signed to allow a circus to show on these grounds.

Mayor Schofield told of receiving a communication from citizens and had answered that he had not issued any license for a circus showing there. The matter will be looked into.

Mayor Schofield presented a bill for a dinner recently tendered the visiting press men and it was moved that it be paid.

Commissioner Bullock recommended that John A. Adams be awarded a contract for painting sheds 1, 2, 3, 1 at Sand Point for \$2,470. On motion this was passed.

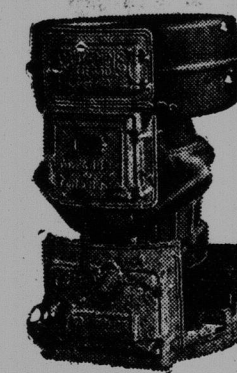
