Sidelights On Sport

The West Side Improvement League is certainly proving to be a live organization and is placing Carleton on the sporting map. Their decision to erect bleachers at the ball grounds will be hailed with delight by hundreds of fans, and their plans to form aquatic clubs and hold a series of races and to promote interest in tennis will be good news for many.

Features of the major league are the jump Cleveland has made in the American league race, the victory of St. Louis over the Giants and the vanquishing of teams in the first division by those of the second. Cleveland is now tied with Chicago for first place, but as they are playing with the Yankees they will have a hard time getting out in front unless they can show superior pitching and hitting than the Red Sox.

However, so long as the public are willing to fall for so called championship bouts of this kind they will be staged by the promoters. Nearly half a million dollars will be paid to watch two big men fight a dozen rounds. It is doubtful if Dempsey could get Willard away in that time, for he could stall his way through and a victory by points in a championship bout is a poor one in the eyes of the fans.

WILLARD UNDER 250 WHEN HE ENTERS RING

Some 2,500 Saw Him in Work Out Yesterday — Dempsey to Resume Cleve Work

Toledo, June 18.—Jess Willard announced tonight that he expected to weigh between 245 and 248 pounds for his heavyweight championship contest with Jack Dempsey here on July 4 and because of the satisfactory progress he has made in reducing his weight has decided to eliminate long runs over the roads from his daily training grind.

Lighter work than has been the rule for several days prevailed in the champion's work-out this afternoon.

Willard cut down his boxing to eight rounds after his strenuous work-out yesterday when he boxed eleven rounds and wound up with four more of shadow boxing. The champion's perfect job was witnessed by 2,500 persons comprising the largest week day crowd in the tented enclosure. Between 400 and 500 women were sprinkled through the gathering.

Willard faced Jack Hepple for the first two rounds and Jack Heinen stepped the third with the champion. Joe Chip, a middleweight, boxed the fourth and sixth rounds, Heinen the sixth and eighth. Heinen was dropped in the sixth round with a left-hand hook to the chin and was bleeding at the nose when he left the ring.

Dempsey also had a light day, but Manager Kearns announced that the challenger would resume boxing on Sunday. Yet a player so disabled took part in the match between Northamptonshire and Lancashire.

When war broke out, Denton had given promise of eclipsing the cricket prowess of his more famous brothers, but when he lost a leg while fighting with the West Kent Regiment his cricketing days seemed to be ended.

With a true sporting and fighting spirit, however, he has refused to let his physical infirmity rob him of the joy of cricket, and is quite proficient with the bat.
