

## Supreme Court Upholds Cancelling Exemptions

Order-in-Council Found Valid; Habeas Corpus Writs Should Not Have Been Granted; Special Session Not Necessary

Ottawa, July 19—By a majority of 4 to 2, the supreme court of Canada this afternoon upheld the validity of the order-in-council of April 20. It is under the authority of this order-in-council that exemptions of men in class one between 20 and 22 years were cancelled. The majority of the court was composed of Sir Chas. Fitzpatrick; Sir Louis Davies; Mr. Justice Anglin and Mr. Justice Duff. The minority, the judges who dissented, were: Mr. Justice Idington and Mr. Justice Brodeur. While not an appeal from the ruling of the Alberta court of appeal, the decision of the supreme court decides the important point of the constitutionality of the orders in council. It disposes of the necessity of calling a special session of parliament.

In the words of the chief justice it decides "That the orders in council dated the 20th day of April, 1918, are valid and binding and that the applicant is properly detained in custody and is not entitled to his discharge."

This afternoon's proceedings lasted but a few minutes. Shortly after 2 o'clock, Sir Chas. Fitzpatrick formally announced the decision of the majority, stating that justices Idington and Brodeur were in dissent. Later reasons were made available, the written majority decision was prepared by Justice Anglin; that of the minority by Justice Idington.

The case arose from the application of Private George Edwin Grey, a farmer drafted under the terms of the orders-in-council, for his release from military service by way of habeas corpus. Grey is under military detention.

BOLSHIVIST IS TINED HEAVILY AT BRANTFORD. Distributed Pamphlets in Factories Urging Limit of Four Hours' Work.

Brantford, July 20—Felix Cosanovitch, a Russian, was fined \$500 and costs, with the option of a year in jail, in police court here for distributing literature tending to injure the production of the war.

The pamphlets sent around local factories by Cosanovitch, working through small boys, called for all workmen to refuse to work more than four hours a day, as this was enough for them to live on, and all work done over that time went into the pockets of the employers. The pamphlets urged that the workers refuse longer to make profits for others, and if they could not get their demands otherwise they should lay down their tools. The whole pamphlet was along Bolshevik lines, save that work was not totally denounced.

RIGHTLY DECIDED ON. RIGHT TO ORGANIZE.

Washington, July 19—President Kennecamp, of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, complained to the war labor board today that it had not decided the demand of the telegraphers for increased wages and better working conditions. Granting of the right of the operators to organize was the only question settled by the board, the complaint says.

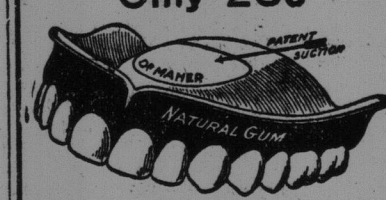
