CANADA IN LONDON

Distinguished Guests at Recent Canadian Club Dinner

DOMINION'S GREAT ADVANCE

The C. P. R. and the Grand Trunk—Lord Strathcona Unable to Attend—E. H. Turnbull There

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, Feb. 19.—No better evidence of the high position Canada now occupies in London could have been given than the Canada Club dinner held at the Princess Restaurant last week. As one Canadian whose experience goes back to the eighties remarked:

"If in those days we could have gathered an assemblage such as this, we could have asserted with truth that Canada occupied a position of unexcelled importance. However, the early hopes held by the organizers of this function have been fulfilled and this gathering is sufficient justification for their optimism."

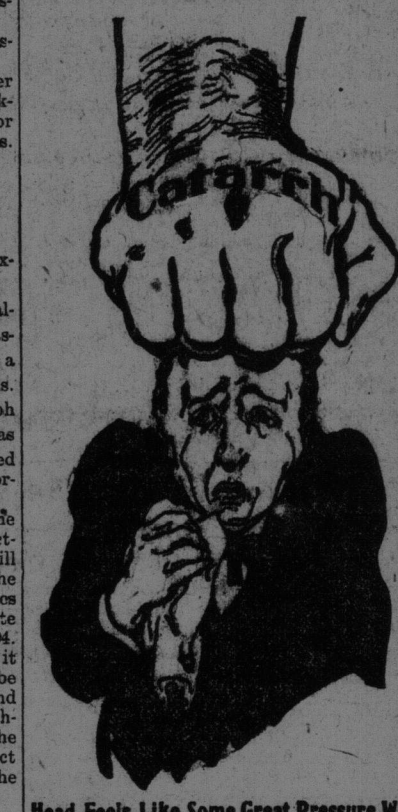
Certainly the presence of so many eminent personages was a wonderful tribute to Canada's commercial and national expansion. A distinguished past chancellor of the exchequer, Viscount Goschen, enjoyed the "mental and physical food provided" to use his own words, and held animated conversation with F. Williams Taylor of the Bank of Montreal. Lord Hindley, who has served in Australia, obeyed the impulse of attraction to magnetic Canada which is moving the men of eminence and influence in Great Britain today. Lord Furness was another financial giant present and Sir John Anderson, G.C.M.G., and others equally eminent in the realms of finance, politics, the bar, the army, and the navy added distinction to the gathering. The Duke of Argyll was prevented from being present in consequence of the mourning of the Duke of Fife.

An interesting feature was the presence of Canadians who have made names for themselves and brought honor to their country in the big affairs of London;—men like Sir Thomas Skinner, the guest of the evening; Donald Armour, F. Williams Taylor, and a host of others.

As is not unusual at Canada Club dinners, many of the addresses were retrospective. Sir Thomas Skinner made an excellent speech. Everyone, even A. W. Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk system, enjoyed his references to the creation of the C. P. R. and the antagonism of the Grand Trunk of that day, which resulted in the financial aloofness of the great banking houses in London. Then he turned to the present time and his statement that sixty-seven steamships now float the seas under the C. P. R. flag, if placed end to end, would measure three and a half miles, brought home to

McEndy of 84 Renwick road, Wakefield, died in the Massachusetts General Hospital. The mother had offered to allow her veins to be drained that the dying boy might have a chance for life by the transfusion of blood. The lad was too late. He died while busy preparations were being made for the mother's act of sacrifice. The mother was proud of her son's act.

Clifford died from injuries received when he was struck by the Portland express car of Boston.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

W. F. Priest of Kentucky has been nominated for the post of U. S. consul at Chastown, St. H. Bank, of Indiana, for Sherbrooke, Que., and G. R. Taggart, of New Jersey, for Cornwall, Ont.

In the police court yesterday afternoon Thomas Chivers, charged with beating his wife, was allowed to go on suspended sentence of \$20 or two months in jail. Len Jackson, charged with being an inmate of a disorderly house, was fined \$40 or three months in jail. May Tapley, charged with using the longer of a house of ill repute and also with stealing \$5 and a gold watch was further remanded. Two prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 each.

W. W. Lee, representing the Y. M. C. A., arrived in the city yesterday from Quebec and for the remainder of the winter port season will interest himself in immigrants arriving here.

TO BOOM NOVA SCOTIA

John A. Macdonald, of Glouce Bay, has been appointed by the dominion government a special immigration officer, and is being sent to Scotland to take up the work there in connection with intending immigrants from Scotland. Mr. Macdonald's work, it is understood, will have special reference to directing immigrants to Nova Scotia, in the hope of having the vacant farms occupied and worked once more.
